SEWA RURAL

SEWA Rural, a voluntary, development-oriented institution has been working incessantly for the past 36 years for the improvement of people in their health and other fields in the rural and tribal areas of Jhagadia in South Gujarat. Inspired by the ideals of Swami Vivekananda and Gandhiji, the activities were started by a group of educated young professionals having work experience in India and abroad. Over the years many like-minded individuals joined hands with them in the development of the organisation and made it what it is today.

It has been the endeavour of SEWA Rural to reach out to improve the lives of the very poor and underprivileged through a variety of health, education and economic development programmes based on the needs of the community in these aspects. Preservation of the intrinsic value systems and broad based development of all those involved including the beneficiaries are kept in mind while carrying out these activities. The focus of all programmes has been the vulnerable members of the family, viz. the women, children and elderly of the poor sections of the society.

In all the activities, an attempt is made to incorporate as well as balance the three basic principles: Social Service, Scientific Approach and Spiritual Outlook.

The various activities of the organisation include:

The 100-bed Kasturba hospital which provides quality medical care to people of about 1500 villages in the vicinity;

The community Health Project which, through timely and valuable care to pregnant women and new born babies & children of 18 Primary Health Centres serves a population of about 5,00,000 using new and innovative mobile phone technology; Use of this technology has helped to reduce the infant and maternal mortality rates significantly among this population;

Our Health Training Centre imparts training to about 500 trainees in healthcare. Trainees include persons from NGOs, employees of State Government Eye Care programmes and students from India and abroad pursuing higher education.

Comprehensive Eye Care Programme provides specialty eye care to a population of about 15 lakhs using ultramodern equipments and specialist doctors.

Community Based Rehabilitation Programme has helped over 800 permanently blind to lead a self-dependent life after suitable skill training.

Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra (Rural Technical Training Centre) has been imparting year long systematic practical technical training to more than 200 partially educated youth from economically backward tribal and rural families and ensuring their employment in industries. Through this programme, these youth become employable and economically independent.

Sharda Mahila Vikas Society has been working for the upliftment of women through a number of economic, developmental and self-empowerment activities. These women-centric programmes, originally started under the aegis of SEWA Rural have been functioning as an independent organisation since 2002 and are managed by a group of women.

The numerous achievements of SEWA Rural during the past three decades include:

Successful management of **Primary Health Centre** of Jhagadia for over 10 years, through which the target of **Health for All by 2000 AD** could be achieved even before the target date; SEWA Rural's **First Referral Unit (recognised by UNICEF and Govt. of Gujarat)** where care for pregnant mothers and newborn babies from Jhagadia and nearby villages are given treatment; through cataract operation, the people of Jhagadia and Valia talukas having population of about 2.5 lakhs were made cataract free as per the definition of WHO. Through a number of training programmes more than 2000 young women and youth could be made economically independent.

SEWA Rural believes in working jointly and in a broad based manner with local community, various national and international organisations, individual well-wishers, government departments, industries, educational institutions etc. Due this approach, it is ensured that the benefits of the developmental work reaches the needy people of tribal and rural community and make a long term positive impact in their lives.

We are pleased to present 36th Annual Report of SEWA Rural for the year 2015-16.

The performance of hospital is enhancing day by day. There is a sharp rise in a number of hospital deliveries which will cross 5000 mark in a short period of time. Along with this, special focus is given to Sickle cell patients by initiating a special clinic in a hospital where mobile phone application is being used for regular follow-up of these patients. To improve the effectiveness of hospital and community health project, an emphasis was given for field operational research studies. As a result various technical research papers are being published in national and international journals.

During the year, a variety of programs were conducted to celebrate the completion of 35 years of SEWA Rural. A range of programs were organized reaffirming the organization's vision, mission and involvement of all workers. SEWA Rural's 35th annual function was celebrated during 19-20 December 2015 in the auspicious presence of Swami Sarvalokanandji (President, Ramakrishna Mission, Mumbai) and renowned social worker and researcher Dr. Abhaybhai Bang (Shodhgram, Gadchiroli, Maharashtra). A book was released titled ' Dhanyatani Kediye : Ekbijane Sathware' which portrays journey, existing activities and sort of self evaluation of SEWA Rural.

A memento was given to all workers as a gift while celebrating 35 years of work. The memento's citation was prepared by all workers which highlights valuable foundations of SEWA Rural. We could accomplish the goal of involving workers among themselves and also in SEWA Rural effectively. They also feel proud to be part of SEWA Rural.

There is a scarcity of space at Jhagadia campus. Beside this Jhagadia area is converting into the semi urban locality. Therefore since a long time we are thinking of starting a new satellite centre in remote tribal and deprived areas.

The Year at a Glance

World Health Organization (WHO) India declared its inaugural national level Public Health Champion awards of 2015. Total five awards were declared in individual and organizational categories who were working in the field of public health since a long time, SEWA Rural is one of them. On 1st April, as a part of the celebration of World Health Day, the award was conferred by WHO's India representative Dr. Nata Manabde.

On 25th May 2015, Gujarat state health minister Nitinbhai Patel visited the hospital while he was in Jhagadia. He interacted with patients and was pleased to see their satisfaction about care and treatment. He complimented all involved in hospital work.

There is a residential school named *Vatsalyadham* at Kamrej in dist. Surat for standard 1st to 12th. The school provides education, hostel, and food for children who lost one or both of their parents. SEWA Rural is working as a link to send children to this school from villages of Jhagadia and Dediypada blocks for last five years. Initially, 45 students were sent for admission. This year new 20 students were admitted in school.

Important programs of the 35th year celebration of SEWA Rural.

As a part of ongoing celebration of 3 ½ decades journey of SEWA Rural, fourth **Local Support Forum** was organized on 7th April 2015. 84 well-wishers from various local areas attended this program. The support forum had three objectives. 1) To receive support from local community in various activities of SEWA

Rural. 2) To provide suggestions and guidance to preserve liveliness of SEWA Rural in coming years. 3) To receive cooperation and support from all well-wishers in unexpected difficult situations. All were familiarized with various programmes of SEWA Rural undertaken in last two years. Also, a new video demonstrating activities was shown. All were happy with various activities of SEWA Rural and complemented all involved in it.

SEWA Rural is a voluntary organization. The total amount of work and how it is undertaken, both are important. Probably how it is done may be more important than the amount of work. Service to poor, value-based work and self-development of workers are SEWA Rural's three missions. Attempts were made to reaffirm these values in the workers by organizing many workshops. During the year from June to August, six workshops were conducted with 200 workers. Objectives of workshop were preservation of informal core values and strengthening of familial atmosphere in SEWA Rural. From doctor to sweepers all participated in it. In workshops games, movie, group work, discussions and the tour were also organized. Shri Atulbhai Makand from Vadodara provided active guidance for these workshops.

On 26th October 2015, SEWA Rural completed 35 years. On this day **Family Get-together** was organized to celebrate the foundation day. Family members of the workers and their parents were invited for the program. Total 350 family members participated and made



the program successful. They were exposed to various programs of SEWA Rural. Selected workers were honored for outstanding performance with a token of appreciation for their hard work and commitment. Family members who attended the program and provided suggestions which will be useful to SEWA Rural. All workers and their family members had lunch with the visiting elders followed by cultural programme. A tour was organized for the elders on subsequent day.

SEWA Rural's annual program was celebrated on 19-20 December 2015 in the auspicious presence of Swami Sarvalokanandanji (President, Ramkrishna Mission, Mumbai) and renowned social worker and researcher Dr. Abhaybhai Bang (Director, Shodhgrm, Gadchiroli, Maharashtra). On the first day, village level workers, staff members, well-wishers and local community members were present in large numbers. On the second day well-wishers, friends, donors and their family members were present in large numbers.

Both chief guests gave illuminating speech on service to people. Swamiji told in his

benediction that *“If water is mixed with Bhakti then it is converted in Charanamrut, Food mixed with Bhakti is converted in Prasad, Work mixed with Bhakti is converted in Upasana”*. It inspired us to continue our services to poor in future. Dr. Abhay Bang spoke at length regarding various issues of public health & raised a concern about increasing addiction in youths and discussed efforts taken to overcome the issue.

A book titled, *'Dhanyatani Kediye Ekbijane Sathware'* which illustrates the journey of SEWA Rural was released by the guests in presence of the founder and present trustees. The book had a cover page which depicted deep understanding of all staff members about the working of SEWA Rural in 35 words.

Main persons of various voluntary organizations of Gujarat are associated with SEWA Rural since last many years. A non-formal group, **General Support Forum** was started in SEWA Rural in the year 2006. It included similar organizations and earnest well-wishers. These like-minded friends, whose work is poor centric, meet every year





for two days. This informal group's gathering has two main objectives; 1) To help each other in mutual difficulties and 2) To support each other during dire situations. It was organized on September 2015. Strong mutual trust and bond among members were built up during the get together. Next get together of General Support Forum is planned on 24th December 2016 at Anjali (Ranasan).

There was a significant rise in a number of workers and beneficiaries over a period of time as we introduced new programs apart from the hospital in Jhagadia campus. Especially workload of hospital services has substantially increased. We are rather concerned about how to keep providing services to this increasing number of patients and visitors every day. On an average, more than 1000 persons visit the campus daily. As a result various systematic measures were taken for their safety in last year.

SEWA Rural started in the year 1980. Since then there is a major change in the general environment of surrounding areas. There is a rise in constructed roads, availability of transport, electricity, and water. Also, economic change is observed among villagers. Availability of health service is also increased. Beside this, there is the development of industrial estate in Jhagadia. Due to this, Jhagadia is getting converted into the semi-urban locality. Because of several of such reasons, we are thinking of starting a satellite center in the interior and needy areas of Dediypada/ Sagabara blocks.

Voluntary organizations, charitable trusts hospital and educational organizations' main

objective is to help society through its work. Besides this, they have to follow legal requirements & guidelines of state and central government. Day by day such legal requirements are becoming more complicated and there is resistance for voluntary action. As a result extra efforts are necessarily being given to be more aware and alert to fulfill statutory requirement. This is taking up more time and vigor.

Various programs are in progress, including training, for poor and needy women by SEWA Rural in collaboration with its sister organization Sharada Mahila Vikas Society since many years. These training programs help to improve the social and economic conditions of women eventually resulting in their empowerment. There was a lack of facilities such as class rooms and hostel for conducting women training programs. For this, country's renowned tea group, Wagh Bakari Tea (Ahmedabad) has provided sizable economic support for setting up a new well-equipped facility for women training center under their Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR). The training center was inaugurated by renowned writer Ms. Himanshiben Shelat at one of SEWA Rural campus, Sharadakunj Housing Society, on 30-04-16. The program was attended by all directors of Wagh Bakari Tea Group and their families, trustees of Darshak Foundation, other guests and well wishers in large numbers.

In SEWA Rural, consistent efforts are taken to maintain system based work and not person based. Founder trustees who were actively involved since its first day, Dr. Anilbhai Desai



and Shri Arvindbhai Desai have now resigned. The responsibility is now shouldered by a new younger team. Dr. Shreybhai Desai (M.D., M.P.H.) and also Dr. Hasmukhbhai Sadhu (Gynecologist, Halol) and Dr. Amiben Yagnik (General Surgeon, Surat) both have been providing services every Wednesday and Tuesday respectively for many years have taken responsibility as trustees. Among founder trustees, Shri Arvindbhai Desai (Valsad), has been looking after system monitoring thrice in a week after his retirement from the Atul Limited.

Darshak Award:

“Shri Manubhai Pancholi Darshak” Foundation is active since 1992 in the memory of Gujarat's renowned literati and educationalist Shri Manubhai Pancholi. Every year Darshak Foundation confer awards to an individual or organization for exceptional work in the area of literature and rural development. The 2015-16 awards were conferred upon renowned writer Ms. Himanshiben Shelat and to SEWA Rural for literature and rural development respectively on 30-04-2016. The program was organized in the presence of former Chief Secretary of Gujarat Government, Mr. P. K. Laheri as a chief guest, along with Darshak foundations' trustees Shri Raghuvveerbhai Chaudhari, Shri Prakashbhai Shah, Shri Mansukhbhai Salla & other well-wishers at SEWA Rural in Jhagadia itself. From SEWA Rural, the award

was received by Bankimbhai Sheth, Jashwantiben Vasava, Shafiqbhai Mansuri, Mukeshbhai Parikh & Parvindaben Patel.

As we already mentioned earlier in last year's report, 7 terminated ex-workers of SEWA Rural had been protesting outside the hospital for various dues, complains and allegations against the organization. All Seven ex-workers have withdrawn all allegations, complains & court cases and an amicable resolution has been reached. Ex-workers have withdrawn their demand for re-instatement.

Due to satisfactory resolution of all these questions, there is an end to all their conflicts with SEWA Rural.

A happy solution to this challenging problem was possible due to the blessing of God, unspoken blessings of beneficiaries, the unity of current workers and mutual trust as well as moral support and warmth of all of you.

Hospital

Aims & Objective : To provide quality health care services to poor, tribal patients residing in nearby areas with the help of available manpower and standard equipment. A center of focus is to provide services to patients irrespective of their paying capacity.

Highlights of the activities :

For the first time in the 35 years history of SEWA Rural, 4877 deliveries conducted in a hospital. The number was achieved due to dedicated and full-time team of doctors which includes three Gynecologists, one Pediatrician, and Anesthetist.

Maximum utilization of governments schemes such as Chiranjeevi, Balsakha, RSBY, 108 Ambulance and Khilkhilat for providing services.

43 gynecology camps were organized in Bharuch, Narmada, and nearby districts last year. 3467 beneficiaries received OPD services while 1089 of them referred for higher treatment. Senior physician Dr. Vora now settled in Jhagadia, whose service is benefitting medicine patients.

A support from Dr. Ajaybhai Shah as an emergency anesthetist. He provided service in more than 1500 Cesarean sections.

Various specialist doctors from outside such as Dr. Kalpanaben Shah & Dr. Apekshaben Shah (Anesthetist); Dr. Hasmukhbhai Sadhu, Dr. Mayaben Hajra & Dr. Ashokbhai (Gynecologist); Dr. Amiben Desai & Dr. Kalpesh Shah (General surgeon) and Dr. Darshan Parikh & Dr. Ankit Atodariya (Dentist) are providing services in the hospital.

Dr. Kaushal (Pathologist) is providing technical support for a medical laboratory. Linking with Christian Medical College, Vellore for improving the quality services of laboratory.

Commencement of eighth and sixth batch of Nursing Assistant and Laboratory Assistant respectively.

Total 844 blood transfusions were given to patients with the help of Surat Raktadan Kendra and Narayan Trust (Surat) at a very low cost.

Good response to Sickle Cell clinic. Total 552 patients are followed up regularly for treatment.

A research study has been started with the help of newly developed mobile phone application for Sickle Cell patients. Plan to use it in community surveys also in near future.

Special treatment / operations of poor patients are being done at hospitals of Bharuch, Surat, and Vadodara with financial help from Well Wishers, Mumbai.

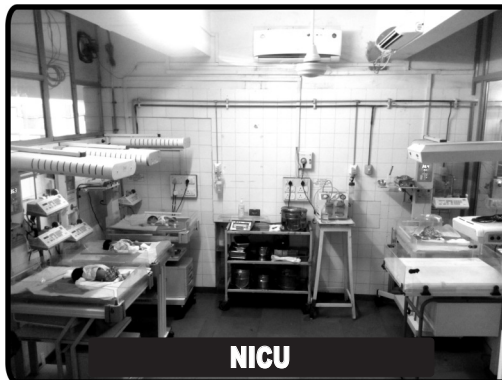
Rise in a number of hospital patients and expenditures. 4.5 corer rupees spent last year where 85% of indoor and 50% of OPD patients were not charged for the given services.

The rise in Bed Occupancy Rate at 140, higher than last year.

Considering an increasing number of patients day by day in the hospital, construction of the third floor is in progress. Also plan of expanding laboratory, labor room, and NICU in pipeline.

Birth of new happiness

Mrs. Umrinalben Kanhiyabhai Vasava, pregnant lady came for treatment at Kasturba Hospital from Avakhal village, around 80 km from Jhagadia. She was a Sickle cell patient with fourth pregnancy. She had history of three abortions which made her pregnancy a high-risk case.

When Urmilaben came for ANC check up, her Hemoglobin was 7.3. This was a high-risk indicator for both mother and baby during pregnancy and delivery. She was advised to hospitalize for the same. Urmilaben and her husband agreed and admitted on 18/12/2015.

During hospitalization, she provided best care by staff. She was given two blood transfusions which increased her Hemoglobin to 9.9. After one month of hospitalization on 20/01/2016, Urmilaben delivered a baby girl with birth weight of 1608 grams. She was discharged on 25/01/2016. Their hospital bill was 6285/- rupees which were very low compared to the private hospital, made free through government scheme.

We are pleased to save the life of both mother and baby because of support from Urmilaben and her husband and dedicated hospital staff. Also, Urmilaben and her husband were very happy with treatment from the hospital. When they discharged from the hospital with their baby girl, a birth of new happiness was apparent on their face.

Comprehensive Eye Care

Aims & Objective : To empower staff of eye department, to provide quality services to the last person in Society and to preserve values in various activities.

Highlights of the activities :

47324 patients underwent check-up at hospital and during eye camps with the help of four full time ophthalmologists.

4976 various operative procedures were carried out.

With kind help of various donors and support from local community, 99 eye camps were conducted in Bharuch, Narmada and Vadodara districts.

Apart from various donors, Hari Om Sewa Trust - Vadodara, District Blindness Eradication committee and CSR funds from various companies has helped extensively with various eye care activities.

Plan of conducting more eye camps in Jhagadia & Valiya block in the year 2016-17.

An education tour was planned at Shri Sadguru Eye Hospital - Chitrakut, Madhyapradesh for hospital and eye department staff members.

A new microscope and phaco machine was purchased for cataract surgery.

As a part of completion of 35 years of SEWA Rural, free operative services for cataract (with lense) was started.

A special help from Dr. Rajeshbhai Patel (Bharuch) assisted in technical support and implementation of operation theater protocols for eye surgeries.

Various super specialist consultants such as a surgeon, Dr. Shitalben (Mandvi), an Oculoplastic surgeon Dr. Sagarbhai (Surat), Cornea specialist Heliben (Surat) and pediatric eye surgeon and squint specialist Dr. Anupamaben has provided valuable service at SEWA Rural.

Around 11000 spectacles were distributed at low cost to patients through Anokhi Optical.

As a part of a blind rehabilitation program, 66 blind children were sent to Tatawadi Fanasa, Sivarimal Andhajan Shala - Dang, Andhajan Mandal - Mogari, Divya Jyoti Trust Mandvi for completing further education.

A workshop for blind children was organised where a large number of children participated.

With the help of Vitthalbhai, blind children were provided assistance from time to time during the entire year.

Eye Checkup Camp

Eye Camp - the Hope for Poor...

Mrs. Niruben Dilipbhai Vasava, a 40 year-old lady was staying with her husband Mr. Dilipbhai Vasava at Narnavi village of Valiya block. around 64 km from Jhagadia. A poor family staying in a kaccha house and earn bread and butter by working on the farm.

From last one year, Niruben started loosing her eye sight. For that, the family tried a traditional treatment which costs around Rs. 6000 to 7000 with no benefit. Over a period of time, Niruben lost her eyesight. Due to this, the whole family shifted to Niruben's mother's place. Nirubens husband became her stick and worked on the farm for earning money.

An eye check-up camp was organized by SEWA Rural in Narnavi village. On examination, bilateral mature cataract was diagnosed in Niruben. Niruben can only understand the direction of light rays but lost eye sight. She was brought to SEWA Rural for treatment. Niruben was operated for cataract and a lense was placed in her eyes.

Niruben regains her eye sight and can see from both eyes comfortably. She was anxious before the operation but after ward felt a lot of happiness after regaining her eye sight. Today a lot of work has been done in the area of cataract but still we see such patients in eye camps.

Training Centre

Aims & Objective : To empower organizations serving in the field of the mother, child, and adolescent health to work independently by providing training and guidance.

548 ASHA's from Bharuch and Narmada districts trained in 22 batches for mother and child health and mobile phone under ImTeCHO project.

12 nurses from government health centers completed training of 'Skilled Birth Attendant' (SBA) at SEWA Rural Hospital

Anganwadi workers and staff members from Manav Sadhana Trust, Ahmadabad trained for mother and child health care.

Skill based training was given for adolescent health to link workers of Valsad Raktadan Kendra, Vansada.

Employees of Setco Foundation, Halol trained for adolescent health and family welfare.

Village workers from Reliance Foundation trained for nutrition in health.

As a part of extension project of Karamsad Medical College, their staff members observed various activities of SEWA Rural.

40 interns and four gynec residents from Karamsad Medical College completed their postings at SEWA Rural Hospital.

12 female students received training for nursing assistants and 4 for Lab assistant.

Indian Students:

MPH students from Belgaon studied 'Patient satisfaction level' at hospital and 'Completion of pregnancy registration' under ImTeCHO project.

MHA students from Tata Institute of Social Science, Mumbai, studied the prevalence of adolescent anemia, the effectiveness of Ferritin in anemia and economic status of patients from slums of Ankaleshwar visiting SEWA Rural.

MSW students from various universities participated in activities at SEWA Rural.

International students:

Students from 21 universities visited SEWA Rural to study health problems of rural Indians. Also, they voluntarily participated in eye camps, Gynec camps, and programs of the tutorial department.

Self-development of staff

Session was conducted every Wednesday for nursing staff in hospital.

'SEWA Rural & Values' workshop was organized for 200 staff members as a part of the completion of 35 years journey of SEWA Rural.

105 staff members from various cadres joined as participant and resource person in 82 workshops held at different places.

Training on Malnutrition

Problem of malnutrition in health workers

We are aware of increasing number of malnutrition in children from rural Gujarat. However, nutritional status of village health workers was surprising as found during nutrition training of these workers. Reliance Foundation, Netrang runs a program for improving intake of healthy food items in the community. All staff members from young adults to elderly screened for malnutrition status by taking the weight, height and Body Mass Index (BMI). Out of 36, 16 (44%) of them were found malnourished. These findings were new to participants. They did not undergo any tests for identifying malnutrition in them and were not aware of their health status. Participants said they will improve their nutritional status and also educate the community. It is essential to be healthy and addiction free while working in the field of community health. There is saying in Gujarati, “Kuwama Hoy Toh Hawadama Aawe” which elucidate the situation here that if health workers keep themselves in good health, then and then only they can make a positive, healthy change in the community. Ground level health workers must take precautions to keep themselves healthy.

Aims & Objective :

To provide employment and business opportunity to tribal and poor youths with the help of technical training.

To make them a responsible citizen by nurturing their life and character.

Highlights of the activities :

Since 1987, More than 2200 students were given training.

As per demands from industries since last few years, various changes has been done which include TIG, MIG and gas cutting in welder trade included. During academic year students were exposed to more technical skills

238 students admitted in the 30th batch which includes 100 students for 6-month computer training. 104 students are successfully employed in July 2015. Total 25 students dropped out of course.

Employed students provided with 'Social Kit 'which includes cycle, fan, cooker as a part of support during employment. Also, fortnightly meetings were organized to address their problems. Due to this, today 94 (90%) students continued their jobs, and seven of them went for further studies.

194 students admitted in the 31st batch which includes 99 students for a computer course and 95 in various courses.

As per technical needs of industries, students were evaluated by a near by fertilizer company. As per their suggestions, appropriate changes were made.

Aims & Objective :

To engage special strength of women for building healthy family and social life.
To make economically and disadvantaged women self-reliant. To organize educational and awareness programs for women irrespective of their caste, race, and religion.

Highlights of the activities :

Due to the expansion of industries in Jhagadia and improvement in the educational level of local young women, there is less interest in joining Papad making activities.

There is a decline in the sale of Papad to canteen contractors of nearby industries due to increasing price of quality products. Due to this we may close Papad making program in near future.

There is an increase in interest in garment making department among women. The number is seen in admission to garment training class since last 4 years increase year by year.

Compared to last year, this time, we were able to provide more business to women in garment department.

Educational tour was organized at Delhi, Haridwar, Dehradun and Masuri for women from garment department

The mobile school was initiated in 2014 which benefitted 647 students of 1st to 4th standard and 626 students of 5th to 8th standard of 12 schools. Students were given complementary education in science and mathematics along with this the extra focus is given on Value based life of children.

As a part of Swami Vivekananda 'Sewa Prakalp' program, 624 students from 13 schools participated in value based education.

Around 5240 adolescents from 44 primary and secondary schools were exposed to various sessions under Adolescent program.

At the village level, different programs were organized for 426 adolescent along with peer educators.

Sanitation program was conducted in 4 villages in Gram Shibir.

Two demonstration toilets were constructed in Shiyali village.

One research paper on adolescent was published in the scientific journal.

Special programs were conducted on adolescent hygiene, awareness, and menstruation in girls.

In a year 15 training sessions were conducted on self-defence for women. These sessions were attended by 650 participants who include students, women staff, field workers, and adolescent girls.

“Gram Suraksha” meeting was organized where representative from police and village head also participated.

This year also we celebrated the birth anniversary of Ma Sharada. On this day a play was organized on inspirational life events of Ma Sharada to elucidate the importance of leadership, decision-making power, and self-defense in today's world. Swami Agocharanandaji attended the program as a chief guest who talked about life events of Ma Sharad and also sang religious songs. On International Woman's day, Sharifaben Vijaliwala came as chief guest who gave a talk on gender equality and also said, “The power of woman is inside her, there is no need to find it outside”.

Nikitaben's father said that his mother worked as a traditional birth attendant, his wife worked as setu worker / ASHA in SEWA Rural and my daughter also was working in garment department. My family became happy due to her earnings and completing education during her work. After many years, there is peace in my home. All set very well at home. Nikita used to solve internal conflicts of her brothers and sisters, also understands them, help them and provide guidance to them.

My son was in the company of bad people but now he is also changed and doing well. Also, there is a change in my daughter's behavior. All this became possible only due to SEWA Rural.

Training videos of ImTeCHO project for ASHA's was prepared with the active help of Adwaitbhai from Surat.

Linking with various national & international organizations such as Janswasthya Abhiyan, Health Forum, National Alliance for Maternal Health and Human Rights (NAMHHR) and Common Health.

ImTeCHO application for nurses was launched. It is being implemented as a pilot project and two nurses were given tablets for using ImTeCHO.

Helpline was set up at Head Office for counselling of high-risk mother and children.

A ray of hope for low birth weight baby

A woman from Naldhari village of Jesalpor PHC of Narmada district delivered her third baby at home before her due date. As soon as ASHA Shitalben came to know about the event she rushed to meet mother and children with mobile in her hand. Due to traditional beliefs and drinking status of mother's husband, they were refusing care from ASHA. But still, ASHA managed to take the weight of baby which was 1.1kg. She explained parents to shift baby to hospital but refused. ASHA entered details of mother and beneficiary in ImTeCHO application. Alert for high-risk low birth weight appeared on ImTeCHO Helpline. Even after counselling by Helpline personnel, parents refused to bring the baby to the hospital. At last parents and ASHA was provided counseling for the care of baby such as Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC), delaying bath, maintaining a septic precaution and spoon feeding of breast milk. As per advise KMC and other things were started. Regular follow-ups were done as per alert in Helpline. On 27th February 2016, the baby was weighed 3kg at the age of 3 months. ASHA completed ImTeCHO training just one month back but due to her and helpline's continued efforts today both mother and baby are healthy. ImTeCHO and ASHA proved to give a ray of hope for saving life of baby.

Research Activities at SEWA Rural and its Effectiveness

Since last many years research focused on disadvantage group is undertaken in SEWA Rural. “Act locally and think globally” is always been at the center of SEWA Rural while providing health services in the community and also their scientific evaluation and publication by SEWA Rural. Also, efforts are being taken to expand programs in government and other NGO's for effectively providing health services to society. Last year mother and child health, Adolescent health, hospital care, Sickle cell disease, poverty reduction and skill improvement related research were conducted. An effective research team is building in SEWA Rural which has 22 data collectors and statistician. To provide required support to research work, Institutional Ethics Committee was formulated.

Following members are part of it; (1) Sudhaben Vadgama (Principal, Sanskardeep Vidyalaya), (2) Dr. Niraj Pandit (Professor, Sumandeep Vidyapeeth), (3) Dr. Ashok Gohil (Niramay clinic, Kevdiya colony), (4) Tarnishtha Roy (Public Health specialist) (5) Chetanbhai Modi (Advocate, Gujarat High Court) (6) Pragneybhai Patel (Statistician and farmer- Ranipura), (7) Dr. Shrey Desai (SEWA Rural) (8) Dr. Dhiren Modi (SEWA Rural) and (9) Dr. Kapil Dave (SEWA Rural).

Brief note of research activities of last year;

1. A cluster randomized trial is being initiated to study the effectiveness of ImTeCHO in five lakh population of six blocks which will complete in 2018. As a part of research, a baseline survey was conducted from January to June 2015 with the help of 50 data collectors.
2. A study was conducted to evaluate the effectiveness of treatment of Sickle cell disease where 150 patients participated. The study was presented as a poster at Consortium of University for Global Health, California, USA.
3. A house to house survey of 250 sickle cell patients was carried out to study various difficulties faced by them. A documentation of it is underway.
4. Equity analysis of patients availing services at SEWA Rural from 2002 to 2014 was conducted. A document has been published enlisting findings of this study
5. A study was carried out to understand the prevalence of complications of delivery in sickle cell affected mothers received treatment from 2010 to 2015. Also, documentation of the findings was completed
6. A cost-effectiveness study of ImTeCHO initiated for a period of 2015-18. Health economist, Dr. Somen Saha from IIPH Gandhinagar is helping for the study.



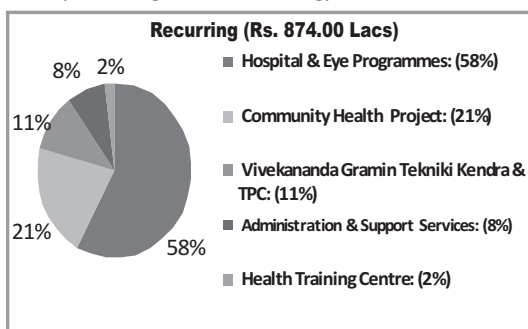




Financial Outlay

Financial support in the form of grants from State Govt. and National and International funding agencies, as well as generous donation from philanthropic organisations, Industrial houses & well wishers from India & abroad have largely been maintained as in past years. Hence atmosphere of confidence & trust in carrying out value based work has been largely preserved.

Total Annual Expenditure (Recurring + Non-Recurring) Rs.1219 lacs



During the reporting year, SEWA Rural spent **Rs. 1219 lacs** in total towards managing various programmes & building supportive infrastructure. Out of this, **Rs. 874 lacs** were spent as recurring expenditure towards delivering various services and programme activities. **Rs. 345 lacs** were spent towards building assets like new construction and procurement of equipment, machineries & vehicles. Expenditure towards administration & support services has been maintained at **8%**, the barest possible.

Generous help by eye camp sponsors from India & abroad and partial grant from District Blindness Control Society are supporting our eye project. CHP's innovative mobile phone technology based research project for safe motherhood and child care is supported by Jamshetji Tata Trust- Mumbai, Indian Council of Medical Reserach-Delhi (ICMR), World Health Organisation-Geneva (WHO), & Macarthur Foundation-USA. In addition, support from Pentagon Trust-Mumbai, Anupam Rasayan-Surat, and govt. grant under SNGO scheme has been

continued for CHP. The health training and resource centre has become almost self sufficient. Construction of new Women's Training Centre has been completed due to large support from Vagha-Bakari Cha Co. Ahmedabad.

Utilization of our hospital services by rural, poor and tribal patients is ever increasing alongwith increase in hospital infrastructure and recurring expenditure. In spite of receiving Govt. grant and in generating income from affording patients, the deficit for the hospital services is now reaching to **85 lacs**. The construction of new ward on the second floor is supported by Mansukhabhai Govindji Trust-Mumbai. In addition Firmenich Co. based in Dahej has promised to support renovation of Laborarty, NICU, Conference room, Labour room & Operation theaters and towards procurement of latest equipments. Endowment interest & donations received from various Philanthropic Trusts and individual donors from India & abroad alongwith contribution from schemes like Chrinjivi, Balsakha & RSBY have become useful in supporting hospital services. However there is a dire need to establish a **revolving fund to the tune of Rs. 2 crores** to meet the cash flaw crisis in hospital services.

Grant from tribal development department of State Govt. continues to be useful for running VGTK. Support from local industries in sponsoring remaining students also continues. Efforts are on to update the curriculum and quality of training so as to meet the norms of govt. certification.

Interest generated from the 9.60 crores of endowment / corpus fund is providing critical support to respective activities and programmes of SEWA Rural.

SEWA Rural proposes to spent about **Rs. 10 crores** during the next year for managing its Medical, Health & Vocational Training related activities and programmes. We have assurance of about **Rs. 8 crores** from grants by govt. and other national & international funding agencies and donation support from various philanthropic organisation & individual well wishers form India & Abroad. We are confident that like in past three & half decades, generous support from all such sources will be continued to meet the deficit **Rs. 2 crores**.

Along with regular programs of an organization and fulfilling its mission requires inspiration, encouragement and active participation of employees. For fulfilling this objective, a committee was formulated having one member from all departments. Through this committee, various activities of staff welfare are being planned. Highlights of such activities from 2015 to 2016 are given here.

1. As a part of the celebration of various festivals such as Navaratri, Sharad Purnima, Diwali get-together, Family get-together, SEWA Rural's anniversary day, National days and sports activities were planned. Staff members actively participated in these activities.
2. A workshop was organized from 23-4-2015 to 30-4-2015 for school going children during vacation. "Gaurivrat program" was organized for children.
3. On the banks of Narmada River, Dinner was organized for staff once in a month. Staff members and their family bring Tiffin from home and eat together.
4. This year a small picnic was organized at Swami Narayan Mandir, Poicha and at Devmogra. A long picnic was organized at Kachch for employees who didn't get chance to attend the last tour.

5. Education support of Rs. 3 lakh was provided through Organization to children of staff members. Also, interest-free Rs. 3.5 lakh loan was provided to children who passed 12th and studying higher education.
6. All staff members were greeted with inspiration book on their birthdays.
7. SEWA Rural took Mediciclaim Policy for staff and their families. 145 employees took its benefits
8. Moral support was provided to staff members for any personal problem or difficulties. Smt. Manjulaben Vasava (Metron), Dr. Gayatriben Desai, Jaymitbhai Raval and Vikrambhai Vansadiya are handling this responsibility.

The Cooperative Society of SEWA Rural's staff : This society runs independently through its members. It's 31st Annual meeting which has 193 members was done on 5th June 2016. Members received 9.5% interest on their annual savings. During the year 168 members received benefits of savings of Rs. 96, 03,275/-, the share of Rs. 5, 10,690/- and loan of Rs 40, 18,700/-. Society earned a profit of Rs. 49,327/- during the year.
