SEWA RURAL

SEWA Rural is a voluntary developmental organization involved in health and other development activities in rural and tribal areas of South Gujarat since 1980. The activities were initiated in 1980 at Jhagadia, located in Bharuch district, by a group of young professionals, who had education and experience in India as well as abroad. Their faith was based upon the ideals and ideas of Swami Vivekananda and Mahatma Gandhi.

SEWA Rural endeavours **to help the poor and underprivileged in rural areas** through health and development activities, keeping in view the needs of that society and the available human resources. At the same time, as an organization, there is an effort to preserve the values in work and strive towards all-round development of the employees. At the centre of all the programs are the disadvantaged members of the family, such as women, children and the elderly, as well as the disadvantaged sections of society, that is, the poor.

Social service, scientific approach and spiritual outlook are at the centre of SEWA Rural's activities. Special efforts are made to ensure that these three foundational aspects are addressed adequately throughout the sphere of the organisation's activities.

The organisation's various functions includes: A **250 bed Kasturba Hospital** through which more than 2000 surrounding villages receive high quality medical services at free or concessional rates. A large number of poor patients are treated free of cost. Under the **Community Health Project**, efforts are underway to reduce the mortality rates among mothers and newborns by empowering health workers through mobile phone software ImTeCHO. SEWA Rural's **research work** has been published in reputed international academic and professional journals. **Adolescent empowerment program** helps a large number of adolescents to become healthy and responsible future citizens. A **health training and resource centre** in which about 50 voluntary organisations and governmental workers from India and abroad are provided health related training every year. Under the **Netra Raksha programme**, advanced eye care is provided to a population of 20 lakhs covering Bharuch and surrounding districts. Every year, around 200 semi-educated tribal and rural youth (boys and girls) are trained to be employed in industry and/or for self-employment after two years of systematic and practical-based vocational training at **Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra**; these efforts have been able to empower them to come out of poverty. The various awareness, empowerment, and economic employment programs conducted since 1985 have been independently taken up and led by women under the SEWA Rural inspired **Sharda Mahila Vikas Society (SMVS)** since 2002. Various financial and awareness programs under the aegis of SMVS are essential in empowering many underprivileged women. Our **extra-school tutorial program** has provided much-needed support to thousands of children annually. As a result, our impact has extended beyond our project area through a unique combination of service, research, training and empowerment programs.

In addition to these activities, we pride ourselves on our **working culture and values of transparency, non-discrimination, harmony among all religions, good governance and collective leadership**. Our founders have made the organisation sustainable by cultivating and creating space for the next generation of leaders. SEWA Rural has been recognised by more than 30 international and national bodies.

SEWA Rural believes in **working with all larger stakeholders and sections of the society** like local community members, voluntary organisations from the country and abroad, government, private industries, educational institutions etc. As a result, SEWA Rural's mission to extend the benefits of development and its far-reaching positive effects to the disadvantaged sections of the society - women, children and the elderly tribal and the poor - continues to be strengthened.



Dear friends,

We are pleased to present SEWA Rural's **42nd** annual activity and the financial report for the year 2021-22.

During the last two years, we have all suffered due to the "corona pandemic". Now, the force of this pandemic seems to be decreasing. But we are not entirely sure yet.

The new hospital construction started auspiciously from February 2022, after completing all the statutory procedures to meet the continuous increase in the number of patients. This project will be covered in two phases and is planned to be completed in the next 2 to 3 years. We are getting generous support from donors from India and abroad for the same, which reinforces our faith in "poor-centric" work. That said, further donation is still required for this ambitious project.

Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra's various vocational courses are also getting recognition from authorities. However, the government grant has not been renewed since 2019, adding to the financial strain on the organisation.

Timely approvals have been obtained for renewal of 12-A and 80-G registration (for tax exemption) and FCRA registration (for foreign donation) of trusts because of the Government's new laws. Also, new registration (for donations from industrial houses) has been done to receive CSR funding.

Dr. Lataben Desai, one of the founding trustees of SEWA Rural, was awarded the **Padma Shri** award by the Government of India at the hands of the President. It was presented at a grand award ceremony held in New Delhi on March 28th 2022. **Dr. Lataben rightly attributed this award to the dedicated workers of SEWA Rural and Sharda Mahila Vikas Society.**

Apart from this, all of you- donors, well-wishers, the local community members, past employees of SEWA Rural, and consultants, those who are directly and indirectly connected to SEWA Rural, are also partners of this award.

We are happy and proud of your continued cooperation. Your feedback and suggestions regarding this Annual Report are most welcome.

The Year at a Glance

During the last year, we have barely come out of the scourge of Corona and now life, business - employment, industries etc., are returning to normalcy.

Some of the highlights during the year are as follows:

- (1) 1,37,214 direct beneficiaries could benefit through various activities during the year.
- (2) We launched few new services last year. An infertility clinic and mental illness clinic was started. A new trade of spinning and weaving started in VGTK. After the successful implementation of the TECHO⁺ project across Gujarat, its implementation has also begun in Uttar Pradesh, which is a matter of pride.
- (3) In the global pandemic of Corona, many charitable organisations and coalitions, as well as many individuals, have kept the flame of humanity burning by joining small and big relief efforts. Apart from this, we bow our heads respectfully to many famous and anonymous corona warriors. SEWA Rural set up a corona centre, and a Covid helpline. Many patients took advantage of this.
- (4) Great Place to Work is an international organisation based in the USA. They annually rate organisations in different categories based on their work culture. In 2021-22, SEWA Rural was ranked 46th among all mid-sized workplaces across India.
- (5) Fire and safety regulations are strictly implemented in SEWA Rural. SEWA Rural Managed Kasturba Hospital has received no-objection certificate from the fire department.
- (6) 12 AA and 80G certificates for SEWA Rural have been renewed as per the amended Income Tax Act. Apart from this, the FCRA certificate has also been renewed. However, now complying with the legal norms is challenging.
- (7) A report has been published by NITI Aayog of the Central Government of India about Not-for-Profit Hospitals across India, wherein SEWA Rural hospital inpatient and OPD treatment costs were found to be the lowest. This demonstrates that SEWA Rural is at the forefront of providing affordable treatment to patients.
- (8) Like every year, this year too a Sanskar Sinchan workshop was organised for the employees in the organisation.
- (9) SEWA Rural - managed Kasturba Hospital is seeing an increase in



patients. Apart from this, there is a need to manage patient beds in the hospital more satisfactorily, keeping in mind national standards. To maintain safety standards and increase some facilities, it has been planned to demolish some old buildings and construct new ones to accommodate additional 150 beds & three new operation theaters in the hospital campus in Jhagadia. Department for Newborn ICU, ICU and Central Autoclave Department are to be created. Apart from these, basement vehicle parking and a sewage treatment plant have also been planned. This project of mega importance is getting favourable responses from donors.

(10) At the end of the year, the Padma Shri Award for Medical Services for the year 2022 was presented by the

Central Government of India to Dr Lataben Desai, one of the founding trustees of SEWA Rural. The award ceremony was held on March 28 2022, at Rashtrapati Bhavan in the presence of the Hon'ble President and Hon'ble Prime Minister of India.

- (11) Dr. Dhirenbbhai Modi is new director of the Community Health Project, and Dr Shreybbhai Desai is assuming responsibility as new director of the Research from January 2022. Many congratulations and best wishes to them for taking responsibility as part of SEWA Rural's tradition to prepare the second line and make it work year after year.
- (12) The 41st Foundation Day of SEWA Rural was celebrated on 26-10-2021. Along with this, a family get-to-gather was held. On this day, many guest and organization members shared about the 40 years of the organisation's history . "Inspiring Maa Sharda", a booklet by Dr. Lataben Desai was also released then. Like every year, the best workers in various organisational departments were honoured.
- (13) The 186th birth anniversary of Sri Ramakrishna Dev was celebrated on February 18th, 2022.
- (14) Six scientific papers were published in domestic and foreign scientific journals.

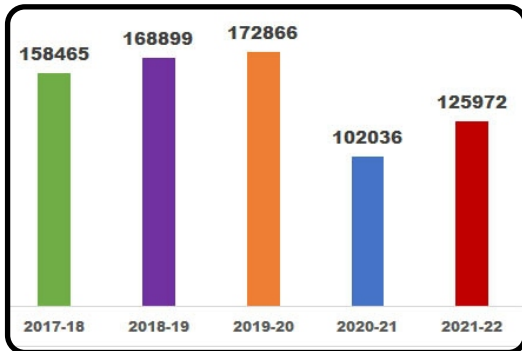
A glimpse of major activities

- Kasturba Hospital, SEWA Rural, has full-time Physicians, Pediatrics, Ophthalmologists, Gynecologists and Obstetricians.
- Tribal patients accounted for 56% of Out-Patient Department (OPD) (1,25,972) and 62% of admitted

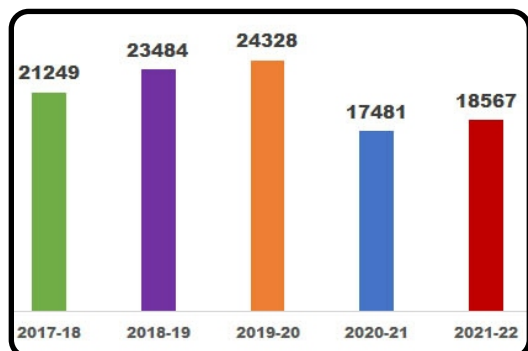
patients (18,567). Due to Covid, there has been a decrease in the number of patients..

- 35% of the patients coming to the hospital came from the most deprived category. (As per SECC-2011, Govt of India criteria)

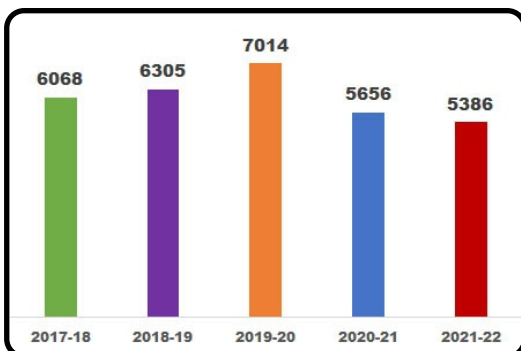
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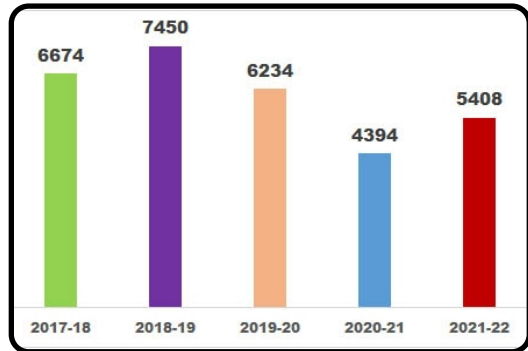

Proper Referral & Communi- Cation Saved The Child

Babitaben, a native of Sagbara (about 90 kms. from Jhagadia), had a second delivery. In her first delivery she had a stillborn child. During pregnancy there was a regular examination by the government doctor.

During her eight-month pregnancy, she had sudden pain and was taken to the Sagbara government Hospital at 11-00 PM in a 108 ambulance. During the examination, part of the umbilical cord came out, so she was immediately persuaded to go to a big hospital.

In Rajpipla, Babitaben was referred to SEWA Rural due to the absence of an obstetrician.

SEWA Rural has created a WhatsApp group with Bharuch and Narmada district government doctors. We were informed in that group and discussed the danger to the woman's health.

When the patient reached SEWA Rural hospital at 2 AM, everything was kept ready. An anesthetist was absent, so a cesarean section was performed under local anesthesia. The baby was not crying well and needed to be placed in a newborn ICU.

The infant was admitted for eight days in newborn ICU and then handed over to the mother. After observing for two days, the mother and the infant were discharged. Treatment resulted in complete recovery. Timely referral, communication and an emergency operation saved the mother and her baby's life.

- "Maa Sharda Karuna and Care Center" (Corona Care Hospital) at Gumandev Campus started in May 2021. A total of 127 patients benefited. All treatment was provided free of cost to the patients.

In a nutshell :

- 5386 deliveries last year (average 15 delivery per day)
- A total of 1,25,972 OPD visits per year (average 420 OPDs per day)
- A total of 18,567 patients were admitted during the year (an average of 51 new patients admitted per day).
- 68% of admitted patients were treated free of cost.
- A total of 1474 newborns were admitted to the NICU for the year (an average of 4 new admissions per day)
- 1,44,368 laboratory tests were conducted during the year (481 tests per day).
- A total of 17493 sonographies were performed during the year
- Total consumption of 1044 blood bags per year (average three blood bags per day)



Medical Services

- Physician's OPD 4 days in a week
- A total of 12401 patients consulted, and out of these, 1186 patients were admitted and treated.
- A total of 17876 patients were examined in the General OPD (Medical Officer).
- A total of 3,356 Sickle cell disease patients consulted in OPD. 184 new sickle cell patients were registered during the year. 1,988 patients are under treatment for Sickle Cell.

Eye Department

- During the year 32 eye diagnostic camps were conducted and a total of 7,597 patients were examined.
- A total of 2024 cataract operations performed.
- 5,498 prescription glasses and 2,423 custom made glasses were distributed.

Benefit Of Govt. Scheme

- From August'22, Chiranjeevi & Balsakha Yojana were discontinued by the Government.
- Out of a total of 18,567 admitted patients, 3156 (17%) patients benefited from various government schemes.
- During the year, 51% of the poor patients who did not have MA/Pradhan Mantri Jan Aarogya Yojana (PMJAY) cards were given free treatment.

Dediapada Satellite Center

- Gynecological OPD started at Bharat Seva Sangh Ashram in Dediapada in January 2021. Pregnant women and non-pregnant patients as well as sickle cell patients are being treated.
- A total of 9,037 OPD consultations were done, out of which 4,550 sonographies, 21,661 laboratory tests, and 474 sickle cell consultations were conducted.
- Now there is a consideration to start surgical OPD & minor surgery for two days a month.
- All the above treatments are provided at concessional rates, and medicines are provided for free.

What are some new initiatives ?

1. Free follow-up consultations (upto 45 days) for all patients admitted to SEWA Rural
2. Started performing small incision cataract surgery (SICS) cataract operations free of charge
3. Free spectacles also started to be provided after 45 days to patients who had free cataract surgery.
4. Cataract patients sent from Rajpipla Civil Hospital operated free of charge.
5. Regarding the new construction, some changes have been made in the hospital system.
6. Caretaker arrangements are made for elderly eyecare patients who have no one to take care of them.
7. Started weekly OPD by infertility specialist.

Nursing Assistant Training

- A total of 18 women, many from under privileged families, from Jhagadia and its surrounding areas were given one-and-a-half years of nursing assistant training.
- Advanced Practical Training for Nursing (APTN) has been started for the nurses who have completed GNM, B.Sc (Nursing), and ANM courses. 6 batches have been completed successfully so far involving around 25 trainee nurses.

Quality Assurance During Treatment

- For the last four years, the mortality rate among patients admitted to SEWA Rural has been 0.5%. Also, the referral rate to higher centre of care/hospitals has remained low around 1%.
- Cataract patients gave 4.75 out of 5 marks for excellent treatment. On average, 90% of patients go home satisfied.
- Despite being a referral centre, the mortality rate among newborns admitted to the Newborn ICU in the last three years remains around 2%.
- Proportion of high risk deliveries was about 64% and in comparison caesarean deliveries were about only 18%.
- An audit of medicines prescribed by doctors has been started.
- Surgical site infection rate (SSI) is about 5%.

Community Health Project

Goal and Purpose:

- To carry out various experiments related to public health to ensure access to quality health services at the community level to the underprivileged rural population. Help to set up effective successful experiments in other areas.

A glimpse of major Activities: Activities Related COVID-19

- Covid-19 was highly prevalent in the surrounding area of Jhagadia during April-June 2021 and January-February 2022. During this time, we provided facilities like home medicine, pulse oximeter, mask, sanitizer, and laboratory to a total of 201 patients through the Covid helpline. For this work, publicity was done through posters in the surrounding villages. If needed, we went to the villages and measured the oxygen level of the needy, sick persons and gave general treatment at home.

A Program Of Community Follow-up Of Newborns Admitted To Neonatal ICU At Birth (SNCU Follow-up Project)

- After being discharged from the SNCU (Special New Born Care Unit), the death rate is higher than usual. Such newborns require more care. For that, our workers go to those children's homes, provide proper treatment at home and refer them if needed. This project is currently running in Jhagadia, Valiya, Nerang, and Dediapada talukas. In this project, new mobile software has been created to work

in the field, and its use in the field has started.

- A total of 1438 children from last year and 700 new SNCU children this year (total 2138) were given follow-up and care advice at home.
- As part of the SNCU follow-up, a close follow-up of children with severe acute



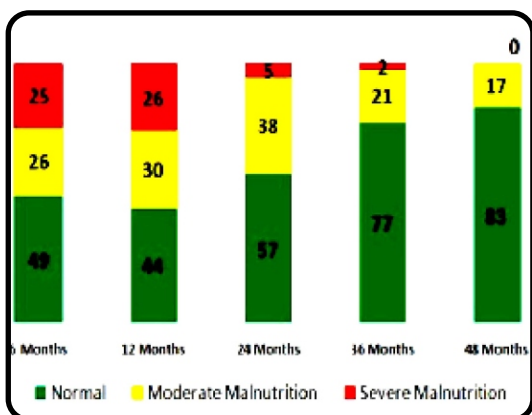

malnutrition (SAM) was done. For this, help of ASHA workers and Child



Malnutrition Treatment Center (CMTC) was sought whenever necessary. 239 high-risk children were closely followed up during the year.

- From April 2018 to September 2018, 166 children were enrolled out of which eight children died and/or were permanently migrated. The remaining 158 children survived and reached four years of age, with a significant 66% reduction in malnutrition.



Using Artificial Intelligence to Measure the Correct Weight of Newborn Babies

- A project has begun to assess the use of artificial intelligence to measure weight of newborn babies in the villages of Jhagadia and Valia talukas in collaboration with Mumbai-based Wadhvani organisation. A total of 417 children were enrolled in this project, and their homes were visited. The project completed in August 2022.

Comprehensive Care Program For Sickle Cell Patients

- Sickle cell is a genetic blood disorder. The prevalence of sickle cell disease is higher in tribal areas. In 2014, a comprehensive sickle cell care program for sickle cell patients was launched. In which we register patients, provide consultation at the weekly clinic, treat and admit patients, if necessary. Patients are treated by a physician, pediatrician, gynaecologist and medical officer etc. Laboratory tests and blood transfusion, if required, are available.
- All patient records are preserved in an IT application which are useful to good quality treatment.
- A total of 1988 patients have been enrolled so far, out of which, 70% of patients visit the weekly sickle cell clinic regularly as per doctor's advice.
- Last year, a total of 1053 sickle cell patients had 3389 OPDs consultations, and 459 sickle cell patients were admitted to the hospital.
- A project to screen newborns for sickle cell disease and follow up in collaboration with the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), Delhi and the National Institute of Immunohaematology (NIIH), Mumbai, has been ongoing since 2019. With this, we have screened total 7656 children. 187 children have been diagnosed with sickle cell disease.
- A camp was held on 18-9-2021 at SEWA Rural for free diagnosis and



treatment of avascular necrosis of hip in sickle cell patients. Treatment was given by Dr. Sanket Diwanji from Surat. A total of 41 patients benefited from this camp. From these seven patients underwent hip replacement surgery, free of charge under PMJAY.

Comprehensive Primary Care Program

- The total number of villages has increased to 6 by adding another five villages to the comprehensive primary care program started last year from Pora village in Jhagadia taluka. Last year we emphasized diagnosing and treating hypertension, mental diseases and diabetes. This year we conducted disease screening in different villages and ran village clinics using technology. Our team completed various disease management trainings at organisations like Trust for Reaching The Unreached (TRU) and Sangath.

TeCHO⁺ & E-kavach

- SEWA Rural is pleased to contribute towards improving the health of people of Gujarat by expanding TeCHO⁺ in the year 2018.
- Seeing the services provided by the health workers using the TeCHO⁺ application in Gujarat, the Uttar Pradesh government also decided to use the Techo + application under the name of E-kavach. SEWA Rural is the training partner in extending this application to Uttar Pradesh.

- After this implementation, SEWA Rural is happy to contribute towards

improving the health services to 24 Crore population of Uttar Pradesh and 6.5 Crore population of Gujarat.

Vatslyadham

- For the past eight years, SEWA Rural has been playing a bridging role in providing residential education in Surat-based Vatslyadham Institution for the poor-orphan children living in Jhagadia and surrounding areas. A total of 84 children are studying in Vatslyadham, and another ten children are studying elsewhere.

Technical Assistance In Malnutrition Project Run by Jashoda Narottam Public Charitable Trust (JNPCT)

- SEWA Rural has provided technical assistance to JNPCT in their health work for the last 17 years.



- Since April 2018, the Malnutrition Prevention Project has been occurring for a population of 90,501 in 62 villages in the interior areas of Dharampur-Kaparada.
- A total of 10,907 children have been registered. As a result, the proportion of children progressing from severely malnourished to moderately severely malnourished or normal has been 82% in the last four years.
- Kangaroo mother care is being successfully experimented with at the field level. Among the newborns born last year, 725 babies weighed less than 2.5 kilograms. Out of these, 88% (639) of children received the benefits of Kangaroo Mother Care in the field as per the rules, which is an outstanding achievement.

Other help

- Technical support was provided to a maternal and childcare program run by the IPPF organisation in Afghanistan.
- Along with various projects, the organisation continues to support other departments. To find out how many underprivileged beneficiaries are being served by various departments of SEWA Rural, we have surveyed each department's beneficiaries. For this, a survey was conducted on about 1000 registered beneficiaries. 24% of the beneficiaries were found to be extremely poor. This information is beneficial for making programs more poor centric.

In upcoming years there are plans to make sickle cell, digital health, malnutrition, child health, primary care, and adolescent health related research

A Mentally Disturbed, Wandering Woman Found a New Life

Who is the most marginalised person in Jhagadia village? A woman often seen on Jhagadia cross roads comes to mind. This woman is unknown, mentally disturbed, in tattered clothes and wandering. If someone comes to help, she does not even take help.

Over the past year, the organisation has started activities related to various non-communicable diseases like diabetes, hypertension, mental health under the community health wellness programme.



Given the organisation's core values of working for the most underprivileged, we feel we should also do something for those living on the streets/living anywhere due to mental health problems. What can be done for such people? How can they be understood? They can be given medicine, but who will administer the medication? So many questions? While we were thinking about what to do in this regard, a trustee of our organisation, fortunately, visited the Ashirvaad Manav Mandir that is managed by Manav Seva Charitable Trust near Surat. Manav Seva Charitable Trust provide residential treatment to the mentally challenged, homeless persons and eventually help them return to family. The answer seems to have been found. After coming from there, this trustee spoke to everyone and gave guidance on what to do if such an individual is to be placed there.

Now, the process of sending the woman living on Jhagadia intersection, to the Manav Seva Charitable Trust started after talking to the Sarpanchsh/Deputy Sarpanch of the Gram Panchayat. They were also ready to help/cooperate in such good work.

In addition, the signature and seal of the police inspector of that area were also required on the form for this woman. After meeting the police inspector and informing him in detail about this, he prepared to give his signature and seal. Coincidentally, a vehicle and staff of Aashirvad Manav Mandir managed was visiting SEWA Rural Hospital Gynecology Department to consult for 3 to 4 residents from their facility. After completing the necessary procedures, we finally sent that woman to the Aashirvad Manav Mandir in Surat along with these residents on November 25, 2021.

The woman was treated and cared for at Aashirvad Manav Mandir. She gradually started getting better, and due to medication, she began to remember/communicate/take care of herself. In a short time, there was a good change. She remembered her family, address etc. When her memory returned, and her communication improved, she talked about her family and said she was staying in Surat. On April 21, 2022, this woman was reunited with her family. At present, she has started living with her family. Her mental illness is also under control.

Adolescent Awareness Programme

Goal and Purpose:

- To reduce the rate of anaemia among adolescent girls aged 10 to 19 years and to raise awareness about reproductive health.
- To help the adolescents who are vulnerable.
- To create a demonstration model for menstrual hygiene management using available government infrastructure.

A Glimpse Of Key Activities

- Worked with 3918 teenagers under the Adolescents awareness programme. Out of which, 1035 (29%) were found to be vulnerable.
- During the corona period, schools and ashram schools were not running regularly, but 80% of the scheduled visits by our staff could be completed.
- Boys and girls from 8th to 12th standard from total of 20 schools, 10 ashram schools and 10 villages were given information on topics like reproductive system, family planning methods, AIDS, changes in adolescence, nutritional diet, personal hygiene using appropriate media.
- 487 boys and girls from 10 villages were counseled about life skills (World Health Organization standard) and the decision-making process during a two day workshop.
- As many as 47 peer educators were sent to Life Camps run by the OASIS organization

- Professional training and practical demonstration throughout the year was provided with 127 peer educators. Using songs, Antakshari and games, insights were provided on topics like - love and heterosexual attraction.



Field based adolescent programme

- Like every year, this year also, 474 youths celebrated Kite Festival. This year the focus was on topics like nutrition, education and de-addiction.
- Adolescent Health Day was celebrated. The youth and teenagers themselves first understood the issues like



addiction, early marriage, dropping out of school and shared information among the villagers through posters on these topics and created awareness.

- Menstrual Hygiene Day was celebrated online. A total of 3146 persons from all over Gujarat, including representatives of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan, UNICEF, Gender Health

Resource Center, state schoolteachers and other officials, joined. DrP Shobhaben Shah talked about the management of menstrual hygiene.

- In the program run by Reliance Foundation, more than 80 women from the interior villages and 160 men-women of the organisation spoke to be sensitive about menstrual hygiene.

Participation of Teachers in the Elimination of Anemia in Adolescents

Adolescent awareness program aims to eliminate anaemia among adolescents. Haemoglobin of Radhaben from Govali School was 7.3 grams during a health check-up. The teachers helped to refer her to SEWA Rural, and after the treatment today, her haemoglobin was 13 grams. Similarly, Geeta ben's hemoglobin (from Kapalsadi) was 6.9 grams, Rina's was 4.9 grams. Seeing this, their teachers talked to their parents and referred them to SEWA Rural.

Amalzar's Ganesha was suffering from throat problems, so the student went to Rajpardi, and Bharuch, for treatment; but it did not get better. They were referred to SEWA Rural. The teacher took care of this student. Today he is well. Dharoli's Rimaben's haemoglobin was 3.4 grams. She took medicine from the primary health centre and also visited SEWA Rural hospital.

Despite the Government's and voluntary organisations' tireless efforts, 56% of adolescent girls and 30% of adolescent boys are anaemic, per NFHS-5 data. But the above case studies show that someone's small nudge and care can bring them out of danger. Having worked in schools for the last 10 years, peer educators inform the teacher if there is no iron medicine, teachers prepare parents to bring at-risk students to the hospital. Teachers show interest in health awareness programs, so students do not fall sick. If these few teachers fight for the health of the students of their class, if the students swallow pills regularly, and bring home-made nutritious food in tiffin instead of the packet food ones, anaemia will be reduced in teenagers!

Training Of Government Staff

- In March 2022, training of "Adolescent Health Counselors" of the Government of Gujarat was organised in two batches on adolescent health, in which a total of 46 counsellors from Gujarat participated.
- Skilled Birth Attendant (SBA) training was imparted to 12 nurses of the

Primary Health Center so that they could perform safe delivery.

- Experiences in Menstrual Hygiene Management Program was discussed in a state level program organised by UNICEF and Gujarat Government.

Graduate Students Placement

- Three students studying Master in Public Health from Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai spent three months. They gained experience in hospital,



rural operations, survey and adolescent department. They studied child malnutrition rate in adolescent departments, government schemes for adolescents, hospital management of emergency medicine in hospitals, payment rejection cases of government schemes and patient problems, and analysis of generic medicines.

- A student studying Master in Public Health at Ganpat University, Mehsana, was placed for three months.
- A total of 49 interns, including 44 from Karamsad Medical College and five from Sevashram, came for internships in the SEWA Rural Hospital.
- Two students from Karamsad Medical College and eight students from Sumandeep Medical College benefited from Gynecology Residencies.
- Two MSW students came from Veer Narmad University (Surat).

Workshop Of Coordination Members

- Two workshops were organised for the Coordination Committee members. Various topics like self-development of workers, family spirit, workplace wellness, concept of voluntary organisation and five languages of love were discussed.
- A survey was conducted regarding the training requirement of most of the organisation's workers and based on its outcome, trainings will be organised in the coming years.

A Workshop For Newly Joined Workers

- Throughout the year, workshops were conducted in 4 parts to help the new employees understand the goals and mission of the organisation. A total of 18 new employees participated in self-defence training.
- About 125 girls and women were given two days of training on health.

Vivekananda Gramin Techniki Kendra

AIM AND OBJECTIVE:

- To provide employment and self-employment opportunities through technical training to youth from low-income families in the outskirts.
- To strive to develop "Responsible Citizens" through life and character building education.

Overview of Key Activities :

- From 1987 to 2022, about 3411 trainees completed their training, and found employment.
- 171 trainees were admitted in batch number 37 in September, 2021, out of which 157 trainees completed the training; they started industry placement from July 15, 2022.
- In the year 2020-21, 64 students of the 36th batch were assisted to get jobs in industries, and they were given the necessary help so they could do their work well after being placed.
- Due to the situation of Covid -19, EPO, spinning, weaving etc. trades were non-residential. Turner, machinist, welder, fitter, electrician, printing etc. trades were residential.
- Students of each trade visited five different industries during the year, and information was given about heavy machinery, heavy instruments, various types of operations and their usage.
- The students were given practical safety training on fire accident and how to handle it by Shri Bharatbhai Rathore of DPMC, Ankleshwar.
- Students of each trade conducted trade demonstrations. Students of other trades and other members of the camp participated; therefore, the technical knowledge and confidence of the student increased.

Salient Points Regarding Technical Training

- Information about the ETP plant was given in EPO Trade by an ex-student of the 33rd batch.



Industry visits by students



- "Road Safety Training" program was organised by the All Gujarat Institute of Driving and Research. Instructors from Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra (Gumandev) joined them.
- The instructors visited UPL University Vataria. They received information about that institute's various workshops, robotic equipment, and research.
- The safety team of SEWA Rural taught the students about the best practices for fire and safety. They discussed the causes of fire and accidents.
- Annual written and practical examinations of each trade were held. The representatives of the industries were called to conduct the practical test. This experience was helpful for students.
- Mr. Maheshbhai Bhatt, Ahmedabad, gave information about the importance of students' health and its remedies.
- Kaminiben D. Raj and Jignashaben from Uchedia informed the students about yoga pranayama and various asanas.
- Several students (in 2 batches) were given the opportunity to attend a workshop on life building skills conducted by OASIS in Chandod. These experiences turned out to be very useful for them and gave them much joy. Students were coached in the areas such as aim of life, positive thinking, power of intention, time management and discipline using games and visual tools.
- Mr. Bimal bhai Sheth from Vadodara conducted a discussion with students on the topic of Youthpower, in which topics like adventure sports, health, power of intention etc were included.

Character Building Activities

- Like each year, each student of the Vivekananda Gramin Technical Centre was given opportunity to learn about concentration, teamwork, creativity, physical labor, discipline etc. topics through workshops that were organized by the organization.
- During the year, students were shown an animation film on the life and work of Swami Vivekanand and related discussion was facilitated.
- The 73rd Republic Day was celebrated by flag-hosting by Deepak Vasava, a trainee of Fitter Trade.
- Revered Swami Suvigyananandaji from the Ramkrishna Mission, Vadodara guided the students and conducted discussion on areas such as cultivating concentration, physical exercise, virtues, timeliness, appropriate use of mobile phone etc.
- Dr. Amiben Yagnik, Surat, imparted extensive training in First Aid to all the trainees.

New Infrastructure

- A new colour printing machine of "Auto Print" company has been installed in the

printing trade and is well used by the trainees in various tasks of SEWA Rural. This work was completed with the help of Vardhaman Acrylics Jhagadia.

- Construction of the Advanced Electrical Lab workshop has been started (donated by Megger Company) and was completed by September 2022.

Training Cum Production Centre

- We were tasked with the responsibility to install 100 handwash stations in five talukas of Gujarat by UNICEF, Gandhinagar. This was completed in September 2022.
- Tasks entrusted by Safari construction, Bharuch and Birla Century, Jhagadia were completed successfully.
- Tasks entrusted by nearby industries and from residents in nearby villages were completed successfully.

Job work

- Completed various tasks worth Rs. 20 lacs for industries and neighboring residents
- Performed motor rewinding and house wiring work in the electrical trade worth Rs. 1.2 lakh.
- We produced handwash and dishwasher as per order in EPO trade. The price of which is approximately Rs 2.8 lacs.
- Job work was done for Safari industries in the fitter trade, and five garbage lorries were built.



Practical industrial training

- In the printing trade, 362 small and big jobs of the organisation were printed during the year. The approximate amount of which is Rs 4,89,780.

We Learned Something New

- New job works were accepted with support from various industries and upon understanding their requirements which led to significantly increase in students' skills, responsibility and quality. These works included jobs from GCPTCL Dahej, Brakes India - Jhagadia, Aarti Industries, Shri Ram DCM - Jhagadia and other industries.
- DCS operation system & its education are becoming necessary for the surrounding industries. Based on that, the DCS system was installed in our centre. All the preparations to start this course were done with the help of DCM Shri Ram-Jhagadia.



Welder Trade - 37th Batch

Name: Vasava Dikshendrabhai Chhatrasinghbhai

Dikshendra Chatrasinh Vasava was admitted to the spinning trade in the 37th batch, and then he decided to move to his favourite welder trade.

In Dikshendra's family, his father tried to commit suicide by drinking poison few years ago. Although he survived, but the drug's effect was terrible on the body. The children had to work as farm laborer and studied only up to 4th standard in the village school. Someone contacted field workers of SEWA Rural. We placed Dikshendra and his sister at residential school "Vatslyadham", Surat.

Meanwhile, their father married second time because Dikshendra's mother had left home. Dikshendra and his sister studied up to standard 12 at residential school "Vatslyadham". But, their mental and economic conditions remained poor.

Dikshendra was drowsy and sat quietly. Saliva was constantly drooling from his mouth. Then, Dikshendra started his further studies at the Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra (VGTK) in Gumandev through the support of workers in the welder trade. The instructors' incredible support and sincere efforts started to help Dikshendra come out of mental depression. As he interacted with the teachers and the other students and staff, he began to talk well, worked and passed the final exam of his training. Now he is mentally healthy. Now, he is ready for industry placement from July, 2022 to August, 2022 and is healthy enough to do job. Currently, SEWA Rural workers are in contact with Dikshendra's uncle, who takes care of him.

We want an education by which character is formed, the strength of mind is increased, the intellect is expanded, and by which one can stand on one's own feet.

Sharda Mahila Vikas Society*

AIM: To create a healthy family and social life by employing the unique strengths of women.

OBJECTIVE: To support the women from economic-socially backward families and to include women in educational and awareness programs without discrimination of caste, religion or creed.

Snacks

- Last year, patients and staff were given hot, fresh breakfast at Corona Care Center.
- Continued to provide sweets and snacks for the pregnant women admitted to the hospital.
- Started selling snacks at the Dediapada satellite centre on a trial basis.
- Supported three women during the year.

Garment Department

- During the Covid pandemic during April- May 2021, only 50% of associate women were coming to work, and all of them could work by observing safety measures regarding Covid.
- We have trained all the women working in garments to stitch shirts and boiler suits.
- Compensation of the sewing work of the associate women was increased.
- Fire safety training is given to all associate women. Understanding was given about steps to be taken and what not to do when an accident occurs.
- We could give work to 65 women in the garment department during the year.

Garment Training Classes

- We have trained 44 associates in two batches of 6 months each during the year.
- Each trainee was trained in self-defence.
- 37 women, who did not have sewing machines, purchased their sewing machines, and the stipend received from the organisation became useful for the same.

Tutorial Classes

- Educational work continued for four hours every morning in the streets of nearby villages until Feb' 2022, when the tutorial classes were closed due to Covid.
- The children who joined the educational work showed a significant positive change in their educational outcomes compared to other children.
- Once schools opened in February 2022, tutorial classes also started. Initially, the children had difficulty studying regularly. Along with studies, programs like celebrating various festivals and tree plantations are also conducted.

* Activities aimed at women's development and empowerment as well as supplementary education and development of children was earlier done under the aegis of SEWA Rural. Now, these activities are conducted under Sharada Mahila Vikas Society, an independent organisation located on the campus since July 2002.

We Became More Sensitive

- So far, we took classes in tutorial classes at headquarter and in schools of neighboring villages. This year, due to the closure of schools due to Corona, we went to the streets of villages and took classes in the courtyard of someone's house, in someone's yard, in the village temple, wherever a suitable place was found and carried out the activity.
- The most significant advantage is that we got an opportunity to get close to the people of the village and know their situation and circumstances.
- We observed and came to know about how much poverty is still there in the villages, and worked with more sensitivity.

Kalrav

- During the Diwali vacation of Nov. '21, we organised various activities with the children of the staff for one week.

Beauty parlour Section

- The beauty parlour training course started in July 2019 as a result of which the women gained skills and able to support themselves. So far, 52 women have completed the course.
- The institute gives a startup kit to women who complete the training course.

Self Reliance

Sejalben Jitendrabhai Vasava of Nana Sanja village, who was trained in the third batch of the beauty parlour course, started her own 'Kavya beauty parlour' on a small scale during the lockdown, which has now grown to a large extent. She has started getting small and big jobs related to beauty parlours, especially in the wedding season. In this way, women are able to contribute financially to bring her family forward by learning new skills.

Women's Awareness Programmes

- As a part of the awareness program, camps are conducted on the last date of every month on various topics applicable to the women working in SMVS.



- Annual general body meeting of Sharada Mahila Vikas Society (SMVS) meeting was held on July 12, 2021.
- The "Aapno Parivar" program started in December 2021 to inspire women of Jhagadia village and the organisation to live happy and peaceful lives with their families.

A total of 265 women enthusiastically participated in this program. "Antakshari" competition and a street play was performed, explaining the importance of family spirit.

- Sharda Maa's 169th birth anniversary celebration was performed enthusiastically in the presence of Revered Pravrajika Sugatprana Mataji from Valsad on December 22, 2021. Taking inspiration from Maa Sharada's life, the women of the staff talked about the positive changes they experienced in their lives.
- International Women's Day was celebrated on March 8, 2022, in the presence of Revered Pravrajika Jnanmayprana Mataji. Women trainees of the organisation spoke about their experiences. Revered Mataji talked about the success achieved by women in today's times. Also, explained the importance of the women who stay at home to manage the whole house well.
- Dr. Lataben answered the questions asked from the audience.

SAFETY, HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY

SEWA Rural strongly believes that a poor-centric, value-based work style and development depend on the workforce's safety, health and environment.

We have formulated Safety, Health and Environment Policy to achieve the above-stated objectives.

- (1) We will not compromise on safety, health and environment while maintaining the goal of pro-poor centric, values-based service.
- (2) Will duly comply with the applicable legal provisions
- (3) Health and Safety shall be the responsibility of the Steering Committee, assisted by Administrative Personnel and Safety Officers/Safety Supervisors.
- (4) The organisation shall endeavour to prepare and provide training programs for imparting training in safe working practices to all levels of employees. All the workers will receive regular health check-ups, health education and guidance to maintain their health.
- (5) Experts shall conduct safety audits, risk assessments and implement their recommendations.
- (6) Contractors working in the organisation & various other agencies shall work by the safe work method decided by the organisation. And it will be his duty to see that his staff know the safety rules/procedures and insist that they follow them, including the safety equipment.
- (7) The meeting of the Safety Committee consisting of the members of the workers of various departments shall be held regularly, and its suggestions are taken into consideration.
- (8) We will develop clear monitoring procedures and emergency response procedures.
- (9) We will make every effort to keep our organisation's environment clean and safe. We will prevent the use of plastic as much as possible.
- (10) In the organisation's annual report, the organisation shall set out the safety, health and environment policy by any statutory provision.
- (11) We will comply with the organisation's safety, health and environment policy, and any statutory provision, without prejudice.
- (12) Accidents occurring in the establishment shall be immediately reported and entered in the register.

We will work with all the employees and managers of SEWA Rural so that all can maintain safety and health and work as a friend of the environment (Eco-Friendly). We will provide this policy to each of our employees and will also make this policy available to anyone interested.



RESEARCH WORKS DONE IN SEWA RURAL LAST YEAR AND LARGE RESULTS

- Scientific approach is an important approach for SEWA Rural. We are doing research on topics such as maternal and child health, non-communicable diseases, sickle cell disease, adolescent diseases, eye diseases, etc. Along with this, an ethics committee has been functioning for the last few years for preservation of moral values in research. This ethics committee had one meeting in the last year.

New and ongoing research studies :

- (1) What kind of healthcare services are helpful and effective for Covid-19 patients in tribal areas of Gujarat and will it be effective?
- (2) Newborn Screening (NBS) for Sickle Cell Disease and providing comprehensive care to understand the natural history of Sickle Cell Disease in Tribal populations in Gujarat, India
- (3) Epidemiological study of mortality of sickle cell disease patients registered in comprehensive care program in non-government organization in tribal area of Gujarat.
- (4) To test the effectiveness a comprehensive sickle cell treatment model designed for people with sickle cell disease in tribal areas of Gujarat.
- (5) To assess the causes of severe anaemia in pregnant women in tribal areas of Gujarat.
- (6) To observe the effectiveness of treatment in tribal pregnant women with severe anaemia and among those treated in SEWA Rural.

Research Works Completed Last Year

- (1) Empower: To develop Global workforce to treat mental illnesses.
- (2) To understand the contextual treatment approaches of people dying due to Covid-19.
- (3) To understand the prevalence of complications after Covid-19 in the tribal area of Gujarat

The primary purpose is for every organisation working to join and get to know each other. Primarily, goals and values of the organisation are discussed frequently, and every worker gets more and more understanding and brings vitality to their work.

Two hundred eighty-two workers in various organisation departments joined the workshop in batches. After Praying and inspiring reading, Dr Shreybhai Desai spoke about the current epidemic of Covid-19. Dr Shobhaben Shah and Dr Gayatriben Desai played a game to recall once again and reinforce the institute's values.

All the workers enjoyed the Gujarati comedy film "Gujjubhai Most Wanted". What is the work of the senior workers of the organisation? How are you doing?



Who is doing it ? What can be the workers' contribution to this work of the organisation? This discussion provided a deeper understanding of the organisation's core values.

Dr Dhirenbbhai Modi explained about 'saving'. He explained why it is necessary to save and how to do it. Then what are the current savings plans? - Mayankbhai Pandya talked about the history of forty years of the organisation by referring to various past events. Then Booklet "Inspirational Maa Sharda", written by Dr Lataben Desai, was released.
- Like every year, this year also, nine workers working in the organisation were honoured as the best workers by the head of the organisation and the chief guest considering their work, devotion to the organisation, speech, behaviour etc.
- Christmas festival was celebrated in SEWA Rural on January 5, 2022, with the aim of all-religious equality. The Priest of Jhagadia Mission arrived as the chief guest. SEWA Rural Employees' Multipurpose Cooperative Society Ltd.

The annual total savings of the members was Rs.1,45,70,753 and 6% savings interest was paid. 8% dividend was paid on share fund. Rs. 51,31,036 loan granted to members. The Society has made Rs. 77,993 net profit. During the year, educational assistance, items in the form of encouragement, a donation to

Educational Assistance

- Educational assistance of Rs.1,23,078 was given to 42 children of the organization's staff members towards their school fees. While Rs. 24,700 has been provided as the tuition fee (for students of standard-10,11,12) for nine children.
- A total of Rs. 2,06,750 loan that is given to six workers to help in higher education of their children. And so far, children of 40 workers have taken advantage of Rs. 12,81,700..

Creche for Child Care

- Killol Ghodiaghar (childcare) was started to take care of small children from 6 months to 6 years so that the women working in the organisation could take care of their minor children and their work. During this year, a total of eight children benefited from full time childcare facility provided by the organisation.



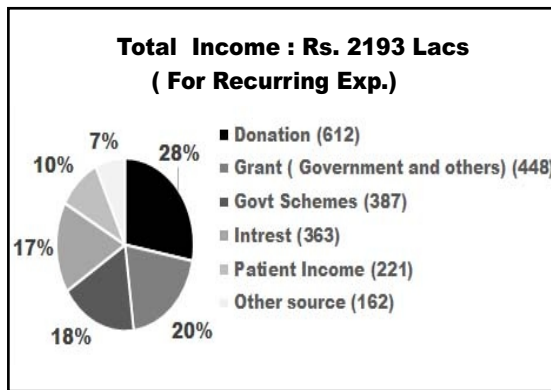
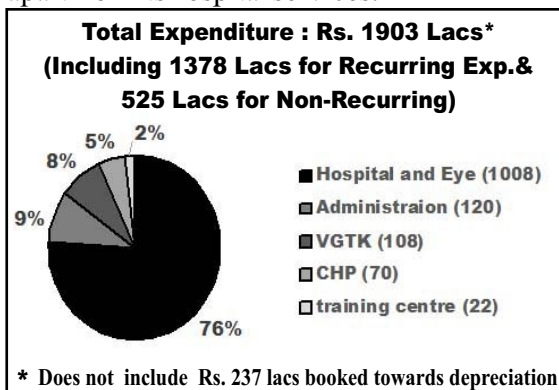
Financial Outlay

SEWA Rural has completed **41 years** of its noble journey to help the underprivileged through health, medical and overall developmental activities. As in previous years, generous donations from India & abroad and project grants from funding agencies and central & state government continued and an atmosphere of trust has been sustained.

The effect of Corona epidemic continued in the second year as well. However this time, SEWA Rural could resume operations of its other field programmes apart from its hospital services.

Project to be used in coming years as per Rule 11(2) of Income Tax Act. The total asset value has reached to **Rs. 4396 lacs** (of which the value of immovable properties is **Rs. 2581 lacs**), while the value of Corpus Investments have reached to **Rs. 2211 lacs** by March 2022.

The recurring expenditure particularly in providing hospital services is increasing largely because of total free / subsidised treatment provided to most of the patients and substantial rise made in staffs' salary during this year. In addition, as state



During the current year, total expenditure was **Rs. 1903 lacs**. Out of that, **Rs. 1378 lacs** were spent as Recurring Expenditures towards delivering various health, medical and education services. While the remaining **Rs. 525 lacs** were spent on Capital Expenditure such as new buildings, equipment, vehicles etc. Expenditures for administration and ancillary services was limited to **9%**. The year-end surplus amount of **Rs. 1246 lacs** have been earmarked for SEWA Rural's Mega Hospital Expansion

government is now releasing limited grant, there was a deficit of **Rs. 104 lacs** in the hospital services this year also. Apart from this deficit, there is an urgent need to create an additional **revolving fund of about Rs. 5 crores** to prevent the funds flow crisis occurring in the hospital.

Construction work for our **Mega Hospital Expansion Project** (now budgeted to the tune of **Rs. 40 crores**) is going on in full swing. Two new buildings will be ready in **one year** time while the construction for



the third building will commence later. We are fortunate to receive generous support from Foreign sources which include Shishirbhai and his friends & Nirman Foundation from USA as well as corporates & Industrial houses (under CSR) & other donors from India. However, there is a need to mobilize additional **Rs. 20 crore** to make this Mega Hospital Expansion Project fully functional.

State government funding for our Vivekanand Gramin Tekniki Kendra got discontinued for last three years as the project period is over. Though process for renewal is on, there is dire need to raise about Rs. 100 lacs every year to manage this programme at present. Substantial

contribution received as Corpus from Dr. Harenbhai and Dr. Pratimaben from USA is a great boon for this programme.

SEWA Rural is estimated to spend **Rs 30 Crore** in the coming year on health and medical services, technical training, ancillary activities, including new construction for hospital expansion project. We already have a commitment of **Rs. 10 Crores** from national and international sources to meet this expenditure. We have full faith and hope that for the noble cause of SEWA Rural, donors from India and abroad, trusts, and industries will continue to come forward to mobilize remaining **Rs. 20 Crores**.

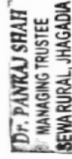

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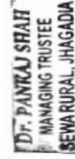
