SEWA RURAL

SEWA RURAL is a voluntary developmental organization involved in health and other development activities in rural and tribal areas of South Gujarat since 1980. The activities were initiated in 1980 at Jhagadia, located in Bharuch district, by a group of young professionals, who had education and experience in India as well as abroad. Their faith was based upon the ideals and ideas of Swami Vivekananda and Mahatma Gandhi.

SEWA Rural strives to help the poor and underprivileged in rural areas through health and development activities, keeping in view the needs of that society and the available human resources. At the same time, as an organization, there is an effort to preserve the values in work and strive towards overall development of the employees. At the centre of all the programs are the disadvantage sections of society. Social service, scientific approach and spiritual perspective are at the centre of the SEWA Rural's activities. Special efforts are made to ensure that these three foundational aspects are addressed adequately throughout the sphere of the organisation's activities.

The various functions of the organization include: 200-bed **Kasturba Hospital** through which people of more than 2500 surrounding villages receive high quality medical services at free and subsidized rates. Under the **Community Health Project**, various primary health services are being provided at home in villages through special technology. These include sickle cell, lifestyle-related non-communicable diseases, follow-up of newborns, etc. **Adolescent Empowerment Program** helps a large number of Adolescents to become healthy and responsible future citizens. **SEWA Rural's research work** has been published in reputed international journals. Under **Netra Raksha Programme**, advanced eye care is being provided to a population of 20 lakhs covering Bharuch and surrounding districts. Every year at the **Vivekananda Gramin Tekniki Kendra**, about 200 semi-educated tribal and rural youth are being trained to be employed in industry and/or for self-employment after systematic and practical based vocational training. The various awareness, empowerment and economic employment programs conducted since 1985 have been independently taken up and led by women under the SEWA Rural inspired **Sharda Mahila Vikas Society (SMVS)** since 2002. As a result, through the unique coordination of service, research, training and empowerment programs, the impact of SEWA Rural is expanding beyond our project area to other states.

In addition to these activities, we are proud of **our work ethic and the values of transparency, non-discrimination, harmony among all religions, good governance and collective leadership**. Our founders have made the organization sustainable by cultivating and creating space for the next generation of leaders. SEWA Rural has received more than 35 international and national awards.

SEWA Rural believes **in working with all larger stakeholders and sections of the society** such as local community members, other voluntary organizations from the country and abroad, government, private industries, educational institutions, etc. As a result, SEWA Rural's mission to extend the benefits of development and its far-reaching positive impacts to the underprivileged sections of society - women, children, elderly, tribals and the poor - continues to gain strength. We are pleased to present the 45th annual report of SEWA Rural for the year 2024–25.

Through this annual report, an overview of the diverse services provided by SEWA Rural during the year for poor, tribal, and marginalized communities is presented, along with audited financial statements and details of donors.

The continued support, cooperation, and guidance received from well-wishers, donors, charitable trusts, funding agencies, corporate organizations, and partner institutions have been invaluable. We express our sincere gratitude to all those who have contributed in various ways to strengthen the work of SEWA Rural.

Over the last three years, major infrastructure expansion work has been undertaken at Kasturba Hospital. Under the ongoing mega construction project, the first two buildings out of the planned three new buildings have been completed. These include the dedicated patient facility center as well as the eye care centre with operation theatres. Construction of the third building, which will house the Newborn ICU and hospital wards, is currently in progress and is expected to be completed during the coming year.

In addition to infrastructure development, advanced medical technologies have been introduced to improve the quality and reach of healthcare services, particularly for patients requiring specialized care. Technology-based systems have also been strengthened at the hospital level to enhance patient care and digital record management.

The Government of Gujarat, through the Tribal Development Department, has approved a five-year project for the Vivekananda Gramin Kendra. This approval will provide critical financial support for operational expenses. At the same time, expansion of academic and residential facilities at the Jhagadia campus is required to accommodate increasing numbers of students and training activities.

With a long-term perspective, efforts have been initiated to develop a strong second line of leadership and responsible professionals to ensure continuity and sustainability of the organization's work in the future.

As SEWA Rural enters its 45th year of service, we welcome feedback, suggestions, and guidance on this annual report and on the organization's journey of service.

The year at a glance

Mission of SEWA Rural

(a) Service to the poor

- To what extent are the deprived and needy beneficiaries benefiting from all the activities of SEWA Rural and Sharda Mahila Vikas Society? For this, a survey is conducted every two years in most of the departments to know the extent of the extreme deprivation. The proportion of beneficiaries suffering from extreme deprivation in SEWA Rural was found to be 19%, in the Tutorial Department 21%, in the Hospital Department 20%, in the Eye Department 34%, in the VGTK 16% and in the Garment Department 32%. The organization has decided to initiate systematic efforts to ensure that nobody suffering from extreme vulnerability is left out within these departments.

(b) Values-based approach

- Employees from even the lowest category follow value based approach. As soon as employees get any items from the campus, or from the hospital, they deposit it with the administrator. How can this be called a big deal? While cleaning the hospital, from the road and other places, a total of fifty-two workers received total Rs. 8754 which they deposited over the last year. All these employees are very needy. Yet their honesty is such that the organization pays us a salary, then how can we receive something given as a gift?

This money received is added in the donation box.

- We have made a sincere effort to carry out all these activities keeping the basic

objective of the organization, the service of Daridra Narayan, at the centre. But as we expand the work, we are realizing our limitations and shortcomings in each activity and we have also been trying to fill the space left for improvement from time to time.

For this, we have set up an internal audit system led by Arvindbhai/Mayankbhai. In addition to internal audit, we have also been getting our various activities evaluated and audited by external expert agencies from time to time. Especially now, the organization also has a big responsibility of legal compliance.

(c) Self-development for employees

- "Development of employees" has been a major theme in the various traditions of SEWA Rural since the beginning. As a result, the workers are fulfilling their responsibilities well. Not only that, but they are also taking on new responsibilities. Currently, about 27 young employees, men and women, are being consciously prepared in this

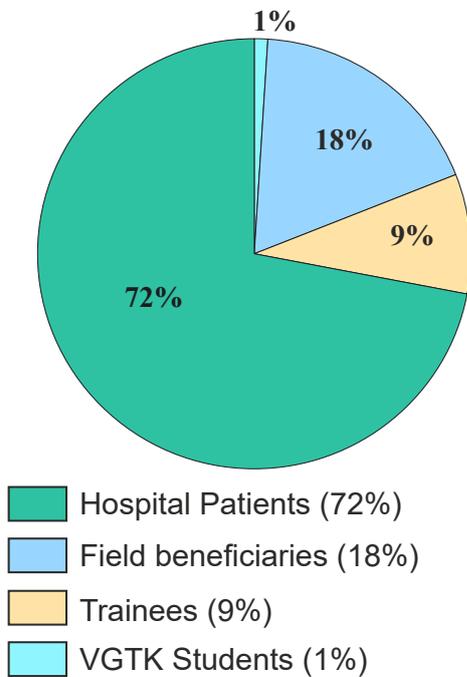


direction by providing various types of training, who can take the organization forward in the future.

(a) Social service

- It is a pleasure to have been able to provide the benefits of various services to a total of 2,45,444 beneficiaries in 2024-25. More than 60% of the beneficiaries are tribals. If we look at the department,



(b) Spiritual outlook

- Out of the two spiritual retreats held every year, one was organized on 20, 21, 22 Sept. 2024. Swami Sukhanandji Maharaj, Bhuj (Ramakrishna Mission) and Swami Medhajanandji Maharaj, (Rajkot Ramakrishna Mission) helped participants reflect on the topic of 'Ramcharit Manas' and Gita Chapter-12

(Bhakti Yoga). 42 members participated in this retreat.

- Mahavir Swami's birth anniversary was celebrated on 27th April'24. Festivals of different religions are celebrated every year in the spirit of harmony among all religions and as per the unique system of SEWA Rural. Dr. Chandrakantbhai Vora explained the program in detail about the hymns, basic principles of Jainism and inspiring life events of Lord Mahavir Swami.

(c) Scientific approach

- A survey of SEWA Rural workers was conducted on 20/8/2024 by the international organization 'Great Place to Work'. A total of 347 workers participated in this survey. SEWA Rural has been in the





Great place to work for five years. It has been ranked in the list of the 50 best places to work for medium-sized businesses across India in the voluntary organizations category.

- SEWA Rural has 62% women workers, reflecting the organization's strong commitment to gender equity, safety, and dignity in the workplace. In recognition of these efforts, SEWA Rural has been ranked among the “50 Best Workplaces for Women” in India (medium-sized organizations) by the Great Place to Work organization, an achievement that brings pride to all of us.



- SEWA Rural is one of the 6 organizations in India to be certified as 'Social Impact Icons' by the international organization

HOSPITAL

Aim and Purpose:

1. To make ultra-modern medical services available to the poorest of the poor.
2. Work to uphold eternal values.
3. Reaching the ultimate height of inner development by serving the lives of the last human beings with the spirit of Shiva.

Hospital team:

- A total of 258 employees, including 24 doctors and about 150 paramedical staff, are working at SEWA Rural's Kasturba Hospital full-time, including physician, paediatrician, eye surgeon, gynaecologist, pathologist, anaesthetist, and medical officer.
- The services of specialists such as general surgeons, psychiatrist, experts in glaucoma-retina-cornea, paediatricians, foetal medicine specialists, anaesthetists, etc. are regularly available as visiting consultants.

We welcomed everyone the entire day like this.

When the patients were welcomed like this, a joy and satisfaction of coming here could be seen on their faces. Along with this, the staff also felt a sense of joy.

- We are especially grateful to the Life Global USA for providing financial assistance of Rs.7,50,37,621 raised from various donors from USA for the “Hospital Expansion Project” from time to time, ensuring that the entire funds reaches the SEWA Rural on time and in accordance with the rules over the last four years.

- Gram Panchayat, Jhagadia has provided additional water connections keeping in mind the increasing numbers of patients in the hospital. Permission has also been obtained from Jhagadia GIDC Association and Notified Area Authority for this and thus the water problem has been eased a little.
- Training was provided by food technologist Nishaben Kamal on 14/7/2024 to the staff working in the kitchen of SEWA Rural-run Kasturba Hospital, which serves patients, relatives and guests, as well as to approximately 40 employees.
- SEWA Rural- run Kasturba Hospital received the Fire No Objection Certificate (NOC) and has now received the ISO45001:2018 Certification for its “Occupational Health & Safety Management System”.

Dediapada Satellite Centre:

- It has been four years since the launch of the Dediapada Satellite Centre. The Satellite Centre has been functioning at Bharat Sevashram Sangh located in Dediapada (Narmada District, Aspirational District), with the aim of providing health services to the poor and needy patients of remote areas. This includes medical check-ups, laboratory tests, sonography medicine, etc. for pregnant women, women with gynaecological diseases, sickle cell patients at a token fee.

Training provided in the hospital:

- So far, a total of 184 needy girls from Jhagadia and its surrounding areas have been trained as General Nursing Assistants for one and a half years. This year, 12 girls from the 15th batch completed this training.
- Apart from this, Advanced Practical Training for Nursing (APT-N) has been started for the women who have completed GNM, ANM, B.Sc. (Nursing), which is of three months duration. About 110 trainee women have been trained so far. After the training, 19 women are currently employees in SEWA Rural. This year, three trainings were conducted in which 11 women took advantage of the training.
- The training of Ophthalmic Assistant for the Eye Department has started from this year. A total of three trainees will undergo one year of training.
- Comprehensive Ophthalmic Fellow: This fellowship has been started with the aim of providing more intensive training to two eye doctors.
- CPS, DGO –1 student of 1st year, 2 students of 2nd year. Approval has been given for 2 years Diploma on OBGYN after MBBS. Students undergo comprehensive gynaecological training at SEWA Rural through a two-year residential program.
- Posting of residents under DRP: Three residents have been posted for three months.



Quality Assurance

1. Labor Room and General Operation Theatre is certified with National Level Certificate “Lakshya”.
2. Laboratory is NABL/EQAS certified.
3. In the last year, the mortality rate of hospitalized patients has been 0.4%. Also, the rate of referral to a larger hospital outside has been 1.5%. For this, a special follow-up system has been arranged.
4. The quality of care from admitted patients has been rated 4.2 out of 5 for good treatment. On average, 94.5% of patients reported satisfaction with care received.
5. Despite being a referral center, the mortality rate in the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) has remained around 0.67% in the last year.
6. The rate of high risk deliveries has increased to 61%, while the rate of caesarean section has remained at 24%.
7. The overall surgical site infection rate (SSI) is about 2.36%, which is similar to the current global rate (3-5%).
8. The complication rate after eye surgery is 1.14%, which is much lower than the globally accepted complication rate (less than 5%).
9. During the year, a total of Rs. 4.98 lakhs of funds have been used for patients who need external tests (CT scan, MRI, Sonography, Lab) and the patient is needy or poor. Total number of patients is 704.

What's New?

1. On 13/07/2024, a new spectacle shop was inaugurated under the auspices of Anokhu SEWA Rural Foundation.
2. On 18/11/24, a medicine shop was inaugurated under the auspices of Anokhu SEWA Rural Foundation.
3. Special rooms were renovated and AC was installed.
4. Renovation of medical OPD, children's OPD, sickle cell OPD was done in OPD area.
5. New ambulance was inaugurated on 25/05/25.
6. On 18/02/25, a new hospital building was inaugurated. It includes Eye OPD, CSSD Unit (Central Sterilization Supply Department), Physiotherapy Center, Modular Operation Theater etc.

7. A total of five blood donation camps were held, in which a total of 209 bottle of blood were collected.
8. Various services provided by the hospital were digitalized. In which discharge module, nurse, doctor, physician, M.O. module was started.
9. The Patient Experience Coordinator is working.

In which

- (1) in the eye department
- (2) With the mother of a baby admitted to the NICU
- (3) With the husbands of pregnant mothers

For which an interesting module has been created. Sessions are held three-four days a week.

10. New equipment was brought for the laboratory.

- (1) Immunoassays (mainly for hormones) VIDAS KUBE machine: For tests of Thyroid and Vitamin B12, etc.
- (2) For Biochemistry (Dediapada Satellite centre) RESPONSE910DIASYS: For testing of Liver, Kidney, Sugar.

Community Health Project

Aim and Objective :

- To provide high quality health services at the community level to the most disadvantaged rural population and conduct research activities.
- To assist the government and other organizations in effectively implementing successful experiments in other areas.
- Provide technical support to voluntary organizations working in underserved areas.

1. TeCHO+ and E-Kavach Project

Objective:

The aim is to make the work of health workers easier and more transparent through technology.

Area:

Entire Gujarat and Uttar Pradesh State (Population 320 million)

Details:

- SEWA Rural has made a significant contribution in training 18637 health workers of various levels. This program has been started in the government structure since 2018.

2. Follow-up program for newborns admitted to the sick newborn care unit (SNCU follow-up Project)

Objective:

- Reduce the mortality rate and malnutrition rate among children admitted to SNCU for five years after they are discharged from the hospital and go home.

Area :

Jhagadia, Valiya, Netrang and Dediapada talukas of Narmada and Bharuch Districts.

Details:

- With 733 new children this year, a total of 4,482 children (0 to 5 years) are being followed up.
- This year, in addition to malnutrition, we began closely following up on children whose mental development is not in line with their age.

Effectiveness:

- Severe acute malnutrition (SAM) was reduced by 85% and moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) by 68%.
- Able to reduce child mortality by about 94%.
- 96% of the scheduled visits for at-risk and severely malnourished children were made on time.

3. Comprehensive Care Program for Sickle Cell Patients

Why :

- Sickle cell patients receive quality treatment so that they can live longer and healthier lives

Area :

Villages of Bharuch, Narmada and Surat districts.

Working method:

This program has been running since 2015. We provided screening for sickle cell diseases, modern standardized quality treatment, and scientific record keeping.

Effectiveness:

- As a part of the Newborn Sickle cell screening and follow-up program, over 15,000 newborns have been screened for sickle cell in the last 11 years, identifying 250 children with sickle cell disease and providing regular follow-up and treatment to 98% of them.



Sickle cell training for Government Health Workers

- We, along with the government, successfully conducted a pilot study to screen young infants for sickle cell on Mamata Day, in which 336 children were screened by nurse using a point of care test.
- Information on 2830 sickle cell patients through field follow-up in the last 10 years has been systematically collected and used for high quality treatment and research.

4. Comprehensive Primary Healthcare Program (ImTeCHO 2.0)

Why :

The aim is to improve access to health services through population-based approach, screening for non-communicable diseases, villages-level treatment and better data collection with the help for modern mobile and web applications, patients and family-centric services, tele-consultation and remote monitoring.

Area :

- Seven villages of Ratanpore sub-centre of Jhagadia taluka and 35 villages of Dediapada taluka (Narmada District) (with a population of 65,000)
- The Program has been started since 2023.

Working method and effectiveness:

- Health workers were trained on maternal and child health.
- Free blood pressure (BP) and diabetes (sugar) screening was provided to all individuals above the age of 40.
- 68% Of 1,966 blood pressure patients and 72% of 448 diabetes patients are receiving regular treatment.
- This year, a new field-level work on mental health and palliative care was launched, in which all patients were treated at home.
- Non-communicable diseases clinics were started in 34 villages. This year, 1620 patients took advantage of it.
- Forms were filled out to find out the causes

of death in the project area. In which, about 68% of the death were due to non-communicable diseases.

5. ConverTech HWC Study Project

Why :

- To strengthen the services of Ayushman Arogya Mandir (AAM) launched by the government of India.

Area :

- The entire areas of the Union Territory of Diu, Daman and Dadra and Nagar Haveli (population 7,50,000)
- The program has been started since 2024.

Working method:

- This project aims to ensure that more people benefit from the 12 comprehensive health services provided by Ayushman Arogya Mandir (AAM).
- For this, a consistent method of data training and monitoring has been adopted using the PHMP (Public Health Management Platform) application.
- More than 18 trainings took place for government health workers.

Effectiveness :

- Based on survey conducted last year, the scope of community service has increased.
- Screening for non-communicable disease has increased from 20% to 90% coverage.

New Year planning

- AAM staff to use of technology and PHMP software for better outcomes.



- Increase the quality of health services in the government.

6. Vatsalyadham Support Project

Why :

- To provide necessary support to orphaned and poor children so that they can get an education and move forward in life on their own.

Area :

- Children from Narmada and Bharuch districts
- The program has been running since 2014.

Procedure :

- Stay in constant touch with the Vatsalyadham organization in Surat. To arrange pick up and drop off orphans. Provide necessary help when they are sick. Meet the parents and make them aware by providing necessary information. Provided support for admission to Vatsalyadham

Effectiveness:

- So far, a total of 395 children has been

admitted to Vatsalyadham. Total 138 children are currently studying.

7. Project to provide technical assistance to Jashoda Narottam Public Charity Trust (JNPCT) in Community Health Project.

Objective:

- JNPCT has had close contact and relationship with SEWA Rural for decades.
- The area of Dharampur is tribal, poor and remote.
- To directly benefit the JNPCT organization from the experience gained through SEWA Rural.

Scope:

- 100,000 population of 107 villages in Dharampur, Kaprada, Pindwal talukas.

Working method:

- For the last 20 years, SEWA Rural has been providing necessary technical field support to various community health projects of JNPCT.
- Training has been provided to about 107 workers of the organization.
- Every month, SEWA Rural's expert doctor visits the various programs mentioned below for continuous monitoring, review and necessary guidance.

(A) Malnutrition Prevention Project

- The project has been running in 62 tribal villages since April 2018.
- A total of 10,689 children were registered.



- There has been a 98% reduction in severe malnutrition rates and a 96% reduction in moderate malnutrition rates.
- The neonatal mortality rate (NMR) was 9 and the infant mortality rate (IMR) was 15.

(B) Adolescent Health Project

- A total of 8397 adolescents were registered.
- Of these, 36% fall into the malnutrition category. Malnutrition can be reduced by 44% compared to last year.
- 31% of adolescent girls have anaemia. (Anaemia reduced by 21% from last year)

The use of clean cloths (falalin) and sanitary pads among adolescent girls during menstruation has reached 100%.

(C) Non-Communicable Disease Project

- Of the 33,746 individuals over the age of 30, 84% (28,321) were screened for blood pressure and diabetes.
- Of these, 4709 (16%) individuals have been diagnosed with high blood pressure and 411 (1.5%) individuals have diabetes.
- About 65% of patients have been started on medication.

A Case Study

Name: Anant Dinesh Vasava (Name changed)

Village: A village in Jhagadia block

- Women having 1st pregnancy.
- Preterm labour pain.
- The baby's birth weight was 726 grams.
- 141 days hospitalized in NICU.
- Family went home against the doctor's orders when weight reached 1,500 grams.
- The child's weight dropped by 200 grams to 1300 grams within 2 days of going home.
- Continuous follow-up at home as per guidelines set by the field supervisor.
- Special instruction was given to the mother and family members to take care of the baby, such as kangaroo mother care, not bathing, hygiene, keeping the baby warm, how to avoid infection, feeding the baby with a spoon if he gets tired while breastfeeding, etc.
- All members of the household paid attention to what was said, and kangaroo mother care was performed.
- When the child was six months old, he was given a special chair because he could not sit up.
- The baby now weighs 5,500 grams at 6 months. He is now healthy.



Adolescent Awareness Programme

Aim and Objective :

- Reduce the prevalence of anaemia among adolescent girls aged 10 to 19, increase awareness about reproductive health, identify and bring out adolescent girls at risk of health problems. Provide information to adolescents about vocational skills. Empower peer educators, provide experiences on menstrual hygiene management within the government framework.

Scope and beneficiaries:

- This program has been running since 2012.
- During this year, a total of 8280 beneficiaries were reached in 50 schools, boarding schools and out-of-school adolescents at village level in Jhagadia taluka, as well as 1789 other beneficiaries at the village level.

Working Method:

1. School session

- Four sessions were held throughout the year in each of the designated schools.

2. Menstrual Hygiene Corner:

- The government has provided 79 menstrual hygiene corners at primary health centres, 52 at community health centres, 11 at medical college hostels, 17 at urban centres, seven at subcentres, and 12 at voluntary organizations.

3. Teacher Training:

- 500 teachers from schools in Bharuch district were trained on menstrual management and the usefulness of the corner.

4. Worker Training:

- A one-day training was conducted for 137 ASHA workers and 186 Anganwadi

workers. In which they were given role-plays to understand the issues of adolescence. Special information was given on anaemia, sickle cell, early marriage, high-risk behaviour, and sexually transmitted diseases.

5. Night village camp:

- The community was made aware through plays, rallies, and health demonstrations on sexual harassment, high-risk behaviour, and other issues at night in seven remote villages. 972 people participated in this

6. Adolescent Health Day Celebration:

- In eight villages, ASHA workers and Anganwadi workers interacted with teenagers and the community on the topics of addiction, malnutrition, and nutritious food.

7. Anaemia and Sickle Cell Camp:

- About 45 adolescents came to this camp at SEWA Rural for further check-ups and treatment.

8. Health Poster Display:

- Posters were put in 17 primary schools, 13 secondary schools and 10 ashrams to provide health education."

9. With Youth of VGTK:

- 200 youth are doing ITI in Gumandev.



They were given information about health topics like anaemia, sickle cell, as well as high-risk behaviour like unprotected sex, addiction, etc. Pretest and post-test, quizzes were conducted, and some students who were addicted were treated with psychiatrists and made intensive efforts to get rid addiction.

10. Vocational Skills and Career Counselling:

- Career counselling was conducted for students of 9th to 12th standard in 13 secondary schools of Jhagadia and Nandod talukas. More than 2600 students participated in it.

11. Self-defence training:

- With the aim of preventing sexual harassment, self-defence training was provided to 320 girls sewing, beauty Parlor classes, nursing assistant students, etc. in the institution. Self-defence training was also provided to 34 teenage girls of Ramakrishna Vivekananda SEWA kendra KIM.

Effectiveness:

- Severe anaemia was reduced by 82%.
- Followed up on 73 children with sickle cell disease and ensured that they took medication regularly.
- A total of 174 teenagers were referred to the hospital.
- All adolescents use safe absorbent methods, with 72% using sanitary pads and 26% using flannel, cloth.
- 28 teenage girls who were experiencing menstrual cramps were referred to SEWA Rural.

Challenges:

1. Teenage girls who do not go to school are not found in the village during the day.
2. The running away of teenage girls who are not going to school and getting married at an early age is a social issue. It seems difficult to stop it.
3. There is challenge of getting enough time with for adolescents in grades 10 and 12 in schools.
4. In some schools, teachers' cooperation is low and the rate of absenteeism among children in high.
5. Anaemia and malnutrition levels do not decrease as much as desired.

Future Planning:

1. Reduce digital work a little and spend more time on “Sanskar Sinchan” work.
2. Helping adolescents for further studies after 10th and 12th standards (in selected schools, to peer educators)
3. Counseling and assistance for vocational skills.
4. Conduct activities with the adolescent children of Sharda Mahila Vikas Society and SEWA Rural staff.
5. Further strengthen AFHS (Adolescent Friendly Health Center).
6. Conducting Adolescent Dissemination (Broadcasting for Adolescent Awareness Program) Workshop.
7. Maintain more contact with teachers, Provide training.
8. Increase parent-child contact



Vivekananda Gramin Techniki Kendra

Aim and Objectives:

- To provide employment and self-employment opportunities through technical training to young men and women from marginalized families
- Striving to create “responsible citizens” through life and character building.
- Creating self-employment opportunities through appropriate technology and self-employment units.

A glimpse of key activities:

- This centre has trained approximately 4453 trainees since 1987 till date.
- In the year 2023-24, 361 trainees from 39th batches completed their training and were supported to get jobs in industries and were provided with the necessary support there so that they could survive and do their work well.
- In September 2024, 481 trainees were admitted in Batch No. 40.
- During the year, four students were supported to start self-employment. So far, 126 students have started their own units/workshops.
- TDD- DSAG (GOG) has approved financial assistance for tribal trainees for the next 5 years i.e. till April 2028 under the Vanbandhu Kalyan Sahay Yojana and a MOU has been signed.

1. Technical Training Activities:

- Self-employment camp : Mayankbhai Mehta and Dr. Niraliben provided guidance to the trainees of VGTK about self-employment. In which, the trainees were given detailed guidance on how to do

self-employment, its necessity, how to sell in the market, long-term benefits of self-employment, how to maintain communication and behaviour while self-employed, etc.

- A CNC operator course was started and a CNC laboratory was made operational.

- Trainees from each trade were taken for technical education at ISRO and Science City in Ahmedabad and at the District Science Centre in Dharampur.
- A project-based science fair organized by Vigyan Gurjari was organized at the Department of Technology and Engineering of Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad University (MSU). In which 9



trainees from VGTK joined the staff. In which various types of solar-based traffic control systems, electric vehicles (EV) and their various parts and their usefulness, usefulness of drone systems in agriculture and how they can be used. In addition, models and videos of various methods for harvesting rainwater were shown.

2. Character building education :

- The trainees were arranged to have a discussion with the saints of Ramakrishna Mission, Revered Swami Shuddhidanandji and Swami Sunil Maharaj. In this discussion, topics like peace of mind, secrets for success in life, worship and understanding of Gayatri Mantra, biography and literature of Swami Vivekananda, importance of concentration in life were discussed.
- This year, Shri Colonel Joshi (Vadodara-Retired Army), Shri Dineshbhai (Motivational speaker and Social Worker), Smt. Kokilaben Pandya (Social Worker), Ittekhhab Ansari (Principal, College of Education, Kharod) helped the trainees in their self-development work and they all discussed the purpose of life, fulfilment of purpose, what to do and what not to do in life, the need for technical training in business, examination as a festival, social topics such as the appropriate and sensible use of media, freedom from addiction and the importance of prayer were explained through group discussions and collective experiments.

- National Youth Day (12 Jan'2025) was celebrated with the alumni students. About 20 past trainees who have succeeded in their lives by taking the training and values of SEWA Rural were honoured as the chief guests. Everyone was very happy to hear the stories they told and the glimpse of the changes in their lives. This event was unique and inspiring. All the teachers' hearts filled with pride while listening to their proud story.

- Former trainees of VGTK Batch No.10 visited the institute. Former staff friends and about 40 former trainees came with their families. In which the former trainees refreshed their memories by talking about their past exciting events of VGTK with everyone.
- The graduation ceremony of the trainees of Batch No.39, beauty parlor and sewing trainees was organized in collaboration with Gujarat Chemical Port Limited (GCPL), in which Shri Rajkumar Beniwal (IAS), Shri Haribhai Patel (Retired IAS), Shri Hemantbhai (Director), Shri Shaieshbhai Nigam (MD), Sameerbhai Rawal (Chairman), Kapilbhai and CSR



team also participated in this program. Apart from this, the staff of SEWA Rural and VGTK also joined.

- The trainees of VGTK were taken to visit the J.N.P.T.I.T. Library in Ankleshwar. In which the trainees were informed about the establishment of the library, various purpose and various activities by Shri Bhadreshbhai Patel. In addition, information was given about the importance of reading in life, the positive effects of reading on our mind and the long-term changes that reading brings in our life.
- Self-Development Camp- A camp was conducted by the staff of VGTK with the trainees of the current batch on topics like teamwork, communication and entrepreneurship etc. In which the long-term benefits were explained of working in team, talking to others only after listening to others calmly. Apart from this, guidance was given about entrepreneurship i.e. different types of self-employments through various activities.

- Work Book Day – On the occasion of World Book Day, a book exhibition was organized in the VGTK Student Library. The main objective of which was to increase the interest of the trainees towards reading and to instil an interest in reading. In which the trainees and staff friends of VGTK participated.

Village: Anjoli, Trade: Welder

When Vasava Vijaybhai Mansingbhai, a student of the 37th batch, joined VGTK, he used to sit very still. Saliva would fall from his mouth. He would not talk to anyone. He seemed very confused. He seemed to have many problems. After first taking admission in the spinning trade, after discussing with him and keeping his demands in mind, he was given admission in the welder trade.

The family problems of his parents, his father's relationship with another women, his suicide attempt and second marriage, etc. were mentally distressing for Vijay and his sister. Vijay studied till fourth standard at his father's home, but before that his mother married another man and left home. The family came in contact with the CHP field staff of SEWA Rural and with the help of SEWA Rural, both of them studied from standard 4 to 12 in Vatsalya Dham, Surat. The SEWA Rural team was in constant contact with both of them. After passing standard 12, Vijay was admitted to VGTK by the SEWA Rural team. The welder trade students and staff at VGTK and the entire team in the hostel also took care him and gave him the necessary warmth. Vijay gradually opened up during the year in the welder trade. His fear went away and his confidence increased. His communication and technical skills started improving. We are all happy that he took industrial training at Galiyankot Engineering Industries, Ankleshwar and after that he was employed in the same industry with confidence.

Sharda Mahila Vikas Society*

Aim and Objective : To strive to create a healthy family and social life by harnessing the unique strengths of women. To uplift the women of families who are lagging behind in economic and social development and to include women in educational and awareness programs without any discrimination of caste, religion or sect.

Economic activity

During the year 2024-25, 57 women earned a living of Rs 38 lakh by doing work worth Rs 139 lakh in economic activities (garments, snacks).

- In the garment department, various types of sewing work are being done, such as aprons for hospital staff, school uniforms, uniforms for industrial workers, boiler suits, and baby kits.
- The snacks department at Kasturba Hospital prepares snacks for patients, as well as dry snacks like masala puri, sev, chakri and thapda.

Vocational skills

To enable the women to acquire various skills and become economically self-reliant, training classes in sewing and beauty parlours were conducted in 10 villages at the locals and villages levels. During the year, 240 women took training in sewing and 231 in beauty parlours.

- Its heartening to know that the trainers at these village based training centers were ex-trainees of our garment programme.

Entrepreneurship

So far, five trainees of beauty parlour classes and two trainees of the sewing classes have

started self-employment and are now self-sufficient. The rest of the women do jobs at home.

Educational Activity

Worked with 1,097 children from 10 schools in and around Jhagadia in the tutorial class.

- Two classes were started at the village level.
- Special classes were started for students who failed in subjects like Mathematics and Science in Std. 10. Students received good support from Zhankhanaben Sheth.

Awareness for women

Along with economic development for women, awareness camps were also organized every month by inviting experienced experts so that women contribute their unique strengths to society, become partners in decision-making and face challenges.

* Activities aimed at women's development and empowerment as well as supplementary education and development of children was earlier done under the aegis of SEWA Rural. Now, these activities are conducted under Sharada Mahila Vikas Society, an independent organisation located on the campus since July 2002.



Safety, Health and Environment Policy

SEWA Rural firmly believes in a service approach that is centred on the poor, values-based work methodology, and the development of personnel. The commitment to safety, health, and environmental conservation remains paramount.

The following objectives, which reflect the stated vision, constitute the Safety, Health, and Environment Policy:

- (1) Focus on service goals based on the needs of the poor, values-based service, and collaboration with safety, health, and environmental considerations.
- (2) Compliance with applicable legal requirements and proper implementation.
- (3) Establishment of a Steering Committee responsible for the safety and health, which includes an administrative and personnel safety officer and safety supervisors.
- (4) Provision of regular training for employees at all levels in safety and work practices, along with maintaining their health through regular health check-ups and necessary health education and guidance in the course of their work.
- (5) Safety audit by experts (Safety Audit), risk assessment (risk assessment) will be conducted regularly, and efforts will be made to complete their recommendations.
- (6) The organization's established safety procedures might be followed by contractors and various agencies working within the organization. It will be the contractor's responsibility to inform their personnel about safety rules/practices and ensure regular health check-ups, necessary arrangements, and guidance for their work.
- (7) Regular meetings of the Safety Committee involving members from various departments will be held, and their recommendations will be considered.
- (8) Clear procedures will be established for inspection, operation, and emergency response.
- (9) The organization will make every effort to keep the environment clean and safe, and all efforts will be made to avoid the use of plastic.
- (10) The organization's annual report will include a summary of safety, health, and environmental performance.
- (11) Without prejudice to the organization's safety, health and environment policy, we will follow any legal provision.
- (12) The organization will conduct surprise inspections without prior notice and record them in the register.

All employees of SEWA Rural will collaborate with all workers and administrators so that the safety of all workers in the organization is ensured, health is maintained, and work can be carried out as an environmental friendly manner (Eco-Friendly). This policy is provided to all our employees and also available to all interested parties.



Research work done in SEWA Rural and major policy contribution

SEWA Rural conducts research to find solutions to the health problems of the local poor-rural community, to give voice to their problems and to evaluate various departments of SEWA Rural itself. An ethics committee has been formed to ensure that all research conducted in SEWA Rural is value-based. All research is conducted after obtaining the approval of this committee.

The contribution of the research work done by the institute towards the comprehensive solution of some of the important health problems of the country has been important this year. Software to measure the weight and height of newborns with the help of artificial intelligence has now started to be implemented in one state. The findings of our study on the causes of anaemia in pregnancy are now useful for developing national-level treatment guidelines. For the first time, a clinical trial has been started to improve the health of pregnant women suffering from sickle cell.

The research studies initiated last year or ongoing are as follows:

1. To examine the effectiveness of Special Neonatal Care Unit Follow-up Project in reducing child mortality and malnutrition in selected blocks of Narmada and Bharuch districts of Gujarat.
2. To screen newborns for sickle cell disease in the tribal areas of Gujarat and India. To examine the effectiveness of treatment given to children suffering from sickle cell disease.
3. Study of the causes of death of sickle cell disease patients enrolled in the comprehensive care program in a non-government organization in the tribal areas of Gujarat.
4. Effectiveness of Hydroxyurea along with standard of care compared to only standard of care on adverse maternal and foetal outcomes: A randomised controlled trial among pregnant women suffering from sickle cell disease
5. Development of data set for artificial intelligence models to screen for anemia using smartphones.
6. Convergence and integration of programmes and leveraging technology for enabling healthcare teams for delivery of equitable, high-quality primary healthcare services through Health and wellness Centres.
7. Effectiveness of a comprehensive primary health care service delivery intervention enabled through a variety of digital health solutions to improve the coverage and quality of selected, high-priority health services in a tribal area of Gujarat, India: A clustered randomized control trial.

Financial Outlay

SEWA Rural completed 44 years of its journey towards overall development of underprivileged communities. 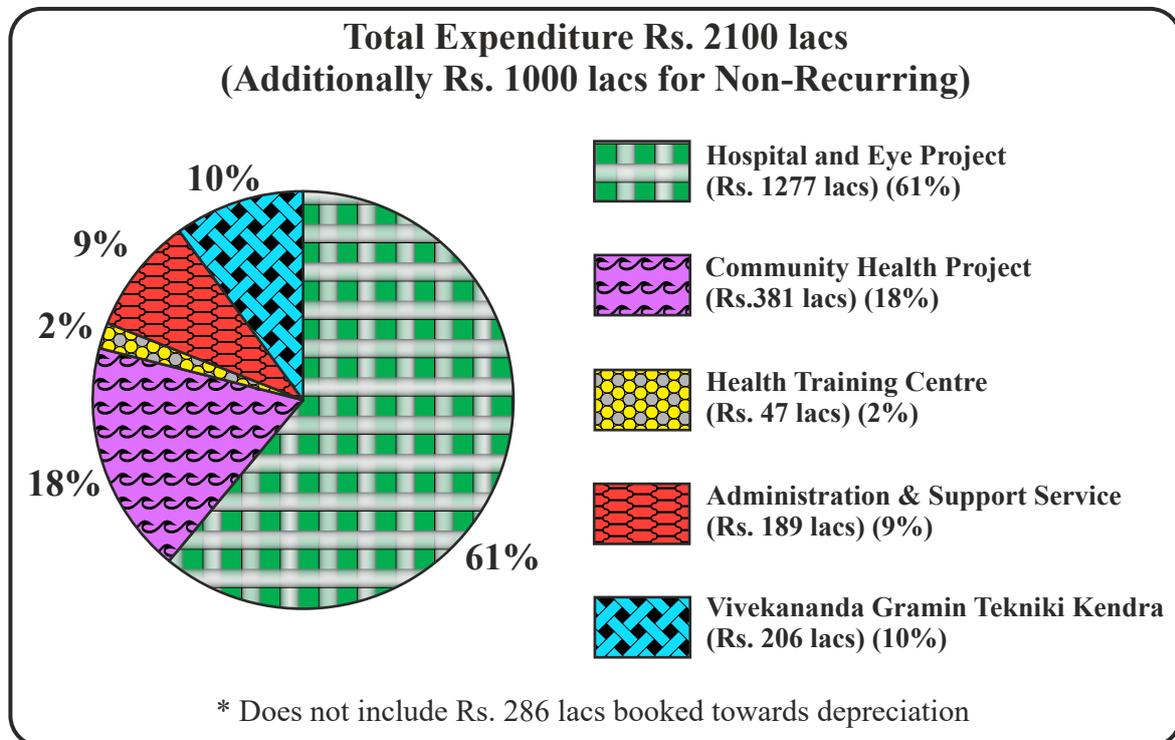
Total expenditure of Rs. 3,100 lacs occurred during the financial year. Rs. 2,100 lacs were spent on various medical and educational activities as recurring expenditure. Remaining Rs. 1,000 lacs were spent on the construction of new buildings, equipment and

vehicles as capital expenditure. Only 6% of expenditure was towards administrative matters.

As per the income tax rule (12-A), surplus amount of Rs. 748 lacs was kept aside for construction and community health project's activities for the next five years.

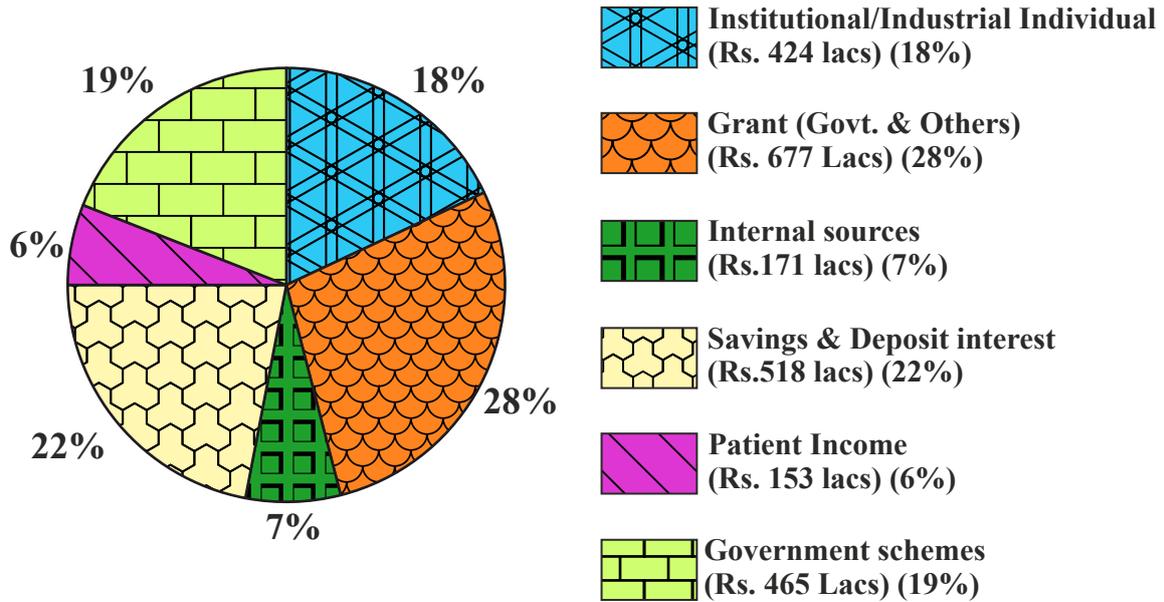
Organization's current asset value was Rs. 3,841 lacs as of March, 2025 (out of which Immovable property amounts to Rs. 2,672 lacs).
